TELL JOBLESS TRUTH. URGES PRENDERGAST

PLEADS FOR HELP FOR EMPLOYERS, TOO

In a letter recently addressed to E. H. Gary, chairman of the Mayor's committee on unemployment, R. H. Johnston, president of the Automobile Dealers Association, says: "One of the principal causes of the unemployment of labor is the warfare which the city departments have been waging upon employers of labor."

SAYS EMPLOYERS ARE QUITTING CITY.

"Still other employers are transferring their activities to other cities and States, knowing full well that if they should rebuild their establishments to meet the departmental requirements of to-day, tomorrow there will be new and conflicting requirements and production must again be interrupted."

ASKS FOR RELIEF FOR EMPLOYERS.

"And now a final suggestion along the same line. The Mayor has appointed a committee to consider unemployment. Can you not prevail upon him to appoint a 'citizens' committee' to consider the question of relieving employers from oppression? The two problems are closely related, being largely the cause of unemployment, and probably the best plan would be for you to consider both of them."

Swears Bryan Tried to Cover Up "Nasty Mess"

James L. Byrne in an Affidavit Charges Minister Sullivan with Plotting to Exploit Santo Domingo for His Personal Profit.

U. S. AND PRESIDENT DISCREDITED, HE ASSERTS

The manifest desire of Secretary Bryan to keep the records of the State Department clean with reference to charges of misconduct against James Mark Sullivan, Minister to Santo Domingo, came out yesterday in the testimony of James L. Byrne before President Wilson's investigator, James D. Phelan.

HIS IMPRESSION OF BRYAN.

"I gathered from that that he did not want to have what I had told him in the records of the State Department. The Secretary of State should either have taken my letter when I said to him or he should have had me prosecuted. No man should be allowed to walk into the office of the Secretary of State and close up the door against an American Minister and be permitted to walk out free."

BRYAN'S AFFIDAVIT.

The affidavit says in part: "Timothy J. Sullivan told me that he had come to Santo Domingo to handle the canal, to build the railroad and highways and other public improvements for the Dominican Government; that he had come there at the request of his cousin, Minister Sullivan, and that the arrangements had been made before he left his home in Springfield, Mass.; that the deal for his employment had been put through by Minister Sullivan, and that James M. McGuire, from New York State, was to be the contractor for this work."

ACCUSES DETECTIVE OF ATTACK.

CARPENTERS PLAN ASSESSMENT TO HELP IDLE UNION MEN.

Owing to the unusual number of unemployed members, Carpenters Union No. 309 will meet next Saturday to vote on a proposition that members who are working pay weekly assessments to aid the unemployed. It is proposed that members earning \$25 a week be taxed 75 cents a week, those earning \$20 a week 50 cents, and those earning \$15 a week 25 cents a week.
