DR. JAMES H. PARKER IS DEAD AT THE AGE OF 72

Former Head of the Cotton Exchange and Prominent as Banker.

Dr. James Henry Parker, former president of the Cotton Exchange, died yesterday in Roosevelt Hospital after an illness of several weeks. He was 72 years old.

He was president of the United States National Bank for a long period and at the time of his death was chairman of the board of the Mutual Alliance Trust Company and a director of the National Bank of Commerce, of the National Reserve Bank and of the Coal and Iron National Bank.

He married in 1877 Miss Julia A. Jones of Charleston, who survives him. Mrs. Parker has been president of the United Daughters of the Confederacy. Dr. Parker's home was at 18 East Sixty-ninth street.
