Wilson Believed to Be Willing to Postpone Free Sugar Five Years.

NEW REVENUE BILLS CONSIDERED CERTAIN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Evidences of the serious situation caused by the falling of Government revenues continued to accumulate to-day. Prominent Democratic leaders in Congress are now acknowledging privately that there will have to be further revenue legislation if the war in Europe lasts many months longer.

It is felt there is no longer any doubt by some of the most important Democratic leaders that sugar will not be permitted to go on the free list on May 1, 1916, the date fixed by the Underwood-Simmons law for the final tariff cut on this important product.

Would Split Texas Into Two States

Bill in State Legislature Proposes to Call One of Them Jefferson.

ASTIN, Tex., Jan. 28.—If a joint resolution which Senator W. A. Johnson introduced in the Legislature to-day is passed and the proposal receives the support of a majority of the votes of the people of Texas a new State to be called Jefferson will be created out of the western half of the present commonwealth.

Mr. Johnson says that the one million people who reside in the territory embraced in the proposed new State are in open revolt against the bad treatment which they have been receiving at the hands of the dominating liquor interests, which he charges are in control of the political affairs of Texas.

The Constitutionalist stormed the building and took the Zapatista prisoners.
