FEDERAL JUDGE TURNS NORMAL CHILDREN BELL LAYS MOVIE PERILS TO PARENTS

Theater Critic Speyer School Starts Special Course for the Too Smart and the Too Dull.

Mayer Tells of the Difficulty of Steering Clear of Plagiarism.

Judge Julius K. Mayer of the United States District Court qualified as a dramatic critic in an opinion written by him yesterday in the copyright injunction suit brought by John M. Vernon against Samuel S. and Lee Shubert, Inc., John C. Huffman and George Scarborough, the playwright.

Mr. Mayer's opinion was written during the hearing on the copyright suit, in which Vernon said that the idea and material in his "Three Days in a Country House" had been embodied in "At Hay," which was written by Scarborough and Augustus Thomas.

"Of course," says the judge, "as so often happens, there are some characters in both plays having a similarity and some instances of similar phrasing. But that is a very old story in playwriting, because there are not many characters and generally a plot can be plotted. Secret marriages, district attorneys, murders, office boys, blackmailers, good people and bad people, all are used in the footstep of many a day, and the only way to arrive at a conclusion on the merits in a case like this is to endeavor to discover the theory of the play, and generally speaking, the method of its execution."

Judge Mayer then praises Scarborough for his ingenious idea and Augustus Thomas for his execution. The usual attempt to enforce the theory that destiny is all controlling, in "At Hay" the authors had no misdeed. Their purpose was to provide an evening's entertainment which would bring customers to the box office and thereby royalties to the authors.

"Les Huguenots" Repeated and Applauded by a Very Large Audience.

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LORD LONDONDERRY DIES AT AGE OF 62

Persistent Leader of Irish Home Rule Opponents Succumbs to Pneumonia.

Special Cable Despatch to The Sun. LONDON, Feb. 8.—Charles Stewart Vane-Tempest-Stewart, Marquis of Londonderry, died to-day of pneumonia at his residence, Wynyard Park, Stockton-on-Tees.

Lord Londonderry succeeded to the title in 1851. In 1856 he was made Viceroy of Ireland and was one of the influential opponents of Gladstone's Home Rule bill of 1886.

He was one of the great land holders of the nation, possessing more than 50,000 acres. Always a Conservative in politics, he made a reputation also at the bar and was a Knight of the Garter and aide-de-camp of the King.

He was married in 1876 to the oldest daughter of the Earl of Sutherland. They had two children.

BARYTONE TIES TO STAGE NAME. Ruysdael Has It Legalized for Matrimony and Inheritance.

That the real name of Basil Ruysdael, the Metropolitan Opera barytone, is Basil Spaulding Millington, was made known in the Supreme Court yesterday when he got permission from Justice Lehman to take Ruysdael as his real name because he is about to be married.

The singer, who is 36 years old, said he assumed the name Ruysdael in 1907 and has become known as an opera singer under that name, but he does not wish to be married under it unless he can do so with legal permission. He said also that he expects to inherit a fortune.
