James Beckman.

SOMERVILLE, N. J., Feb. 10.—James Beckman, 73, father of Asaph M. Beckman, Speaker of the New Jersey House of Assembly last year, died of apoplexy to-day at his home in Manhattan. He retired at about 10 o'clock last night apparently in his usual health.

John B. Hanft.

John B. Hanft, a member of the firm of Hanft Bros., florist, died yesterday at his home, 125 East Eighty-seventh street, at his eighty-third year. He is survived by his wife, five sons and five daughters.

William Brooks Gurley.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 10.—William Brooks Gurley, 71 years old, ex-president of the Washington Stock Exchange and the father of the Rev. Melville Gurley, died of a cerebral hemorrhage at his home in Germantown, Pa., to-day.

Pembroke D. Gwaltney.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 10.—Pembroke D. Gwaltney, 78 years old, one of the wealthiest men in the South and widely known as the "Peanut King," died in his home in Smithfield, Va., to-day. He served with Lee during the civil war.

Hugh Minturn.

BOSTON, Feb. 10.—The death in London of Hugh Minturn, 72 years old, formerly of New York, was announced here to-day. Mr. Minturn was the son of the late Robert Hoyle Minturn. His mother is a sister of the late Col. Roger G. Shaw. Mr. Minturn was graduated from Harvard in 1904. Afterward he studied law and practiced in New York. In 1872 he married Miss Rebecca Higgins of South Branch, who with one son, Dr. Howard Merrill of Brooklyn, N. Y., survives him.
