

COLORADO GOVERNOR MAY SAVE LINDSEY

Machine Democrats Expected to Support the Bills to Abolish Juvenile Court.

WOMEN FIGHT MEASURES

DENVER, March 6.—Whether the fate of Denver's famous juvenile court will be left to Gov. Carlson to decide is a question causing speculation in political quarters.

Action on the Sabin bills in the lower house of the Legislature providing for the abolition of the court as a separate institution has been postponed. According to Judge Herlihy, Lindsey's friends, the postponement is due to the fact that supporters of the measures cannot rally enough votes to pass them.

Author of the Bills.

The father of the bills is Representative E. M. Sabin of Denver, an attorney, and one of the leaders of the Republican majority in the House. One of the measures provides for the repeal of the act creating the Juvenile Court. The other provides for the transfer of the work of the court to the District Court and the appointment of an additional judge to sit on the District bench.

There are now five branches of the District Court, a judge presiding over each. The judges rotate every three months from one court to another. If the Sabin bills should become laws, there would be six instead of five judges and the Juvenile Court would become simply a division of the District Court. There would be no special judge elected to preside over it, but each of the six judges of the District Court would take turns in sitting in it. The clerical work would be handled by the clerk of the District Court.

The ostensible purpose of the move to abolish the court as a separate institution is economy, but it is commonly known that the real object is to get rid of Judge Lindsey. Politicians are among those who support the movement.

The politicians are those Judge Lindsey has fought since he has been in politics. They are now in power and do not conceal their eagerness for a chance to "get back" at the Judge of the Juvenile Court. Allied with them in the support of the Sabin bills are said to be the coal operators, who think the children's judge should be punished for his journey East in behalf of the Ludlow sufferers. The corporations Lindsey castigated in his "Beast in the Jungle" are also believed to be heartily in favor of the bills.

Two More Years to Serve.

Judge Lindsey's present term has two more years to run. Hitherto it has been impossible to defeat him in elections. Some of his political enemies agree with his admirers that should the attempt to legislate him out of office be successful, he will be elected for a fourth term in November, 1916, by the biggest number of votes he has yet received. If he is let alone these politicians predict that he will be defeated.

It is evident that the Judge has lost popularity in the last two or three years. He himself has expressed disappointment that women, his former staunch champions, have not rallied to his support to the extent that he expected.

When he returned from the East a year ago an organization composed of men and women opposed to his methods made charges against him at a public meeting. Only two women's organizations, both small in point of membership, would permit him to appear before them to answer the charges.

A large part of the sentiment that has arisen against him is due to the undesirable advertisement he has given Denver in his speeches in the East. But outside of those persons directly attacked by him the public seems to be with him in the present fight against his court. Men and women, even in their criticism of him are indignant at the movement to put the Juvenile Court out of existence for no other reason than to get rid of the man who presides over it.

The Denver Woman's Club has passed resolutions declaring that the abolition of the court would be "a disgrace to woman suffrage, a disgrace to the State and a worldwide blow to the humanitarian movement for the recognition of the rights of children."

The members of the Democratic minority in the Legislature are for the large part machine Democrats. The machine Democrats are numbered among Judge Lindsey's ancient enemies. So there is little doubt that with a few exceptions the Democratic legislators will vote with the Republican champions of the Sabin bills should the measures be pushed.

But should the bills pass the Legislature Gov. Carlson will have to be reckoned with. Those in the confidence of the Governor's "kitchen cabinet" declare he will veto the measures should they be sent to him.

Some of the politicians are predicting that the bills' supporters will force the Governor to sign them as the result of threats to block some of his own pet measures.

3,960 LIVES SAVED IN YEAR.

That is What Drop in Death Rate Means to New York.

A health hint issued by the State Department of Health says that the death rate for the State dropped from fifteen persons per 1,000 in 1913 to 14.6 in 1914. Translated into common language this means that 3,960 lives were saved within the year.

This was the lowest rate in the history of the State. The proportion of deaths in this city was much lower than in the rest of the State and the department declares that 25,000 persons can be saved from death within the next five years.
