ALBANY, April 1.—After an all day wrangle, in which bitter accusations were exchanged, old political scandals dug up and a gag put on the Democrats, the Senate to-day approved and sent to the Governor the Hinman bill creating a new State Tax Department to take the place of the Tax Commission, and the Machold bill permitting the Governor to name a single Conservation Commissioner to take the place of the three Democratic Commissioners.
