

TEN DAY CAMPAIGN FOR BELGIAN FUND

Relief Committee Holds "Inspiration" Dinner to Discuss Plans.

OTHER RELIEF EFFORTS

Plans for a ten days whirlwind campaign to raise additional funds for the Belgian American Relief and Unemployment Fund were discussed at an inspiration dinner held in the Hotel Plaza last night and attended by more than 200 active workers.

Among the speakers introduced by Richard Welling, treasurer of the fund, were the Rev. Dr. H. Peeters, J. H. Larson, Dr. Albert A. Brown, Alfred G. Waagstaff, chairman of the fund, the Rev. Dr. John Wesley Hill, Martin W. Littleton, Carl Davis Robinson, William H. Hamilton, Anna Bamford Goushain, Percy MacKay, Mr. and Mrs. Bourke Cockran and Capt. Alfred Dupont of the Belgian army.

Announcement was made yesterday of various dances, teas and lectures which will be held in the near future to secure money. The first tea for the campaign will be held at 7 o'clock tomorrow at 5 P. M. at the Plaza.

Many fresh appeals emphasizing the necessity for funds for the above have been received. The American Ambulance Hospital in Paris has asked for twelve volunteer nurses immediately. Contributions should be sent to J. P. Morgan & Co.

The Belgian Relief Fund's booth at the Woman's Industrial Exposition at the Grand Central Palace was well patronized yesterday.

A war relief clearing house for France and her allies has been formed by the ladies in relief of the French country for the purpose of facilitating the operations of the various organizations.

HUERTA HERE FOR REST; WON'T RETURN TO MEXICO

Ex-Dictator Plans to Visit Friends and May Go to Washington.

"I have come here entirely for pleasure and to admire the wonders of your great country. As far as I have any business at all it is of a purely private and family nature."

In such or similar words Gen. Victoriano Huerta, former dictator of the Mexican republic, replied yesterday to all inquiries as to his purpose in visiting this country. "I am an old man and my time has come to take my recreation," he added.

Delayed three days by contrary winds, the Antonio Lopez of the Spanish line, in which Gen. Huerta arrived from Barcelona, via Cadix, took eighteen days for the voyage. Gen. Huerta showed no desire to elude the swarm of reporters, photographers and moving picture men who boarded the ship at Quarantine.

He submitted smilingly to their ministrations, allowed himself to be posed with a docility almost surprising in one so stern a governing record and shook hands with all and sundry who came to greet him.

He was accompanied by his wife and two children. He is reported to be in excellent health and excellent spirits. He has, however, aged somewhat in appearance since his days of power and is considerably thinner.

No Delay in Being Admitted. Considerable curiosity had been aroused by rumors of the probable arrival of the ex-dictator.

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U.S. SHIP TO TAMICO TO SAVE AMERICANS

300 Men Out of Work and Now Facing Famine, to Be Brought Home.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—The United States Government again is to engage in the transportation of Americans from Mexico back to the United States.

At the request of the State Department the army transport Sumner is to be sent to Tampico at once to bring to Galveston several hundred Americans who find it impossible to remain longer in Mexico and who have no other means of reaching their own country.

The meeting in the Tampico district for the last few weeks has forced the American and other oil companies to suspend or reduce their operations.

Already more than 300 Americans have notified the United States Consul at Tampico of their desire to return to the United States and their inability to provide themselves with transportation.

The Carranza agency to-night claimed a fresh victory over the Villistas. It was announced that the northern leader reported that he engaged 2,000 Villa troops near Huasachito, thirty-six miles south of Nuevo Laredo, early to-day and defeated them in detail.

STATE TO GOVERN WIRE LINES.

MINNESOTA Governor, It is Said, Will Sign Telegraph Bill. ST. PAUL, April 12.—A fight of fifteen years for State control of telegraph lines was virtually ended to-day when the House of Representatives passed the Minette-Burrows bill as agreed on by the House and Senate, which places the jurisdiction of the telegraph companies under the State Railroad and Warehouse Commission, which is empowered to fix rates, compel physical connection of competing lines and govern other regulations.

KITCHENER NO TERROR TO VON HINDENBURG

Has No Real Army, Says German—Russians Becoming Exhausted.

Special Cable Dispatch to The Sun. BUDAPEST, April 12.—Gen. von Hindenburg is quoted as having said the following to a neutral correspondent: "Kitchener has a million soldiers, but no real army. He has just a uniformed crowd. The officers and non-coms lack the experience of German officers, who have generations of military training behind them."

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
