BENSON STEADY AT FIRST

Columbia continued yesterday mauling the formerly invincible Williams nine from whose Princeton left Tuesday and when the New England collegians left South Field for home they bore mistaken signs of fatigue and defeat by a score of 10 to 1, a schedule of one night started for seven days so weary the Purple team that it proved easy prey for the curves of Big George Smith, who pitched shutout hill up to the eighth inning. The lone tally for the visitors resulted in the eighth inning, when Don Beck allowed Bowen's single to slip through his legs so clearly that the Williams pitcher was able to scamper home.

Columbia slammed the ball with all the vim and vigor that characterized every game except the Holy Cross contest. Thirteen hits were made for a total of eighteen bases. Big George Smith trounced a branch of his family, Ed Smith, who had just entered the box for Williams, with undue warmth. He drove the ball to Livingston Hall for a clean home run, the first since Eddie Collins was a member of the Blue and White nine.

Syndicate Proposes to Build Hotel and Clubhouse on Long Island Site.

FREEMAN ADVISES Four semi-public golf courses around a combination clubhouse and hotel are to be constructed on Long Island at a point which may be selected from the Pennsylvania station in less than thirty minutes. It is impossible to announce the exact location of the proposed golfing center at this time, but as soon as the purchase of the land is completed the plans of the project will be given out in detail.
