

MAY SEND SIEGEL TO JAIL TO-MORROW

District Attorney's Office Confident Merchant Will Serve Court's Full Sentence.

OPINIONS ON OFFER SPLIT

Henry Siegel may spend the next ten months in jail. His chance of evading execution of that sentence for his part in the failure of the Siegel department stores and banking firm in December, 1913, depends on the action of Supreme Court Justice Clark in the Livingston County Court House at Genesee to-morrow morning.

Justice Clark sentenced Siegel to ten months imprisonment and fined him \$1,000. The jail sentence, however, was suspended on condition that Siegel would make a "substantial" repayment to the bank depositors. He was allowed until the second Monday of this month, but owing to the illness of John B. Stanchfield, his counsel, the time was extended until to-morrow.

The court session is expected to be a lively one. Justice Clark, of course, has given no indication of his view, but Siegel's opponents believe he will not consider the offer a "substantial" repayment. On the other hand, Siegel, it is believed, may elect to serve ten months in jail rather than part with any more cash than \$150,000.

WOMAN CAPTURES TWO WITH BULLETLESS GUN

Halts Strangers Who Enter Apartment, but Flee on Hearing Scream.

Mrs. Sarah Schimowitz of 55 Lenox avenue, who owns the four story flat building at 146 West End avenue and has a dozen houses in Harlem, captured two men with a revolver loaded with blank cartridges last night after they had entered an apartment on the second floor of the West End avenue building.

She was awakened by a noise when she was taken to the West Sixty-eighth street station the lieutenant was uncertain as to the charge that could be made against the prisoners and sent them to the night court.

Mrs. Schimowitz said she had carried a revolver since a year ago, when two men tried to rob her of \$1,700 while she was on a rent collecting tour, but that the weapon was usually loaded with blank cartridges.

At the second floor landing, she said, two men attacked her, one seizing her by the throat and the other by the wrist. The woman wrenched herself free and then fired one blank shot into the air, which caused the two men to enter a corner of the hall.

CARRANZA IN ROW WITH OBREGON AND CABINET

Four of First Chief's Advisers Quit and He Goes to Island Fortress—Landing of United States Forces to Be Resisted.

WASHINGTON, June 19.—That Carranza's position in the Mexican situation is in serious danger of being weakened by internal dissensions within the group which he heads was the conclusion drawn here from advices received from Mexico to-day.

Official dispatches reported the withdrawal of four members of Carranza's Cabinet, followed by Carranza's retirement to the ancient fortress of San Juan de los Rios, in Vera Cruz harbor. Other advices also brought up again the question of Carranza's loyalty to the First Chief, about which there has for months been many reports.

Serious dissensions from Carranza as a result of these events are regarded as possible or even likely. It is believed here that should these occur Carranza's chances of obtaining supreme power are greatly lessened at the moment when things seemed more favorable to him than for many months.

Complete advices have not yet been received from Vera Cruz, and in official quarters there is a disposition to suspend Carranza until more details have been received. According to present understanding, however, Gen. Obregon took a hand in the Cabinet resignation, and Carranza's retention of the office of the four men who resigned and the dismissal of the fifth.

RESIGNED INSPIRED ATTACK

The four who resigned are Rafael Zubiran, Minister of the Interior and ex-agent at Washington; Eusebio Verdugo, Minister of Justice; Luis Cabrera, Minister of Finance, prominent a year ago among Constitutionalists at Washington; and Jesus Urrutia, Minister of Foreign Affairs. Their resignations followed a newspaper attack on them said to have been written by another member of the Cabinet.

Obregon is reported to have stood for the retirement of the men who wrote the article, while Carranza himself is said to have favored the retention of Cabrera, but all four men stood together and withdrew at the same time. It is said that the differences were purely personal, but the fear is expressed here that these personal differences may lead to movements against Carranza.

Gen. Gonzalez is also mentioned as having been in the situation. His movement to Mexico City is reported to have been suspended until the situation is again adjusted. While away he met with Carranza's quarters, and reports have reached here frequently that Carranza and Gonzalez, particularly the former, were inclined to their own interests rather than to the time in the field for the benefit of Carranza.

VILLA'S GOOD FAITH PRAISED

The Villa agency tonight issued a statement denying reports that Villa was offering to compromise because of weakness in the field. It was stated that as soon as Gen. Obregon, Carranza's chief commander, had been defeated the offer of compromise will be promptly renewed as an evidence of Villa's good faith.

WILL PROPOSE PACE MEETING IN U. S. OR NEUTRAL BORDER POINT

EL PASO, June 19.—A definite proposition regarding a meeting between the Villa and Carranza's forces will be made early next week by Gen. Miguel Diaz Lombardo, Villa's Minister of Foreign Relations, which will either transmit the proposition or go in person to Washington.

NEIGHBORS OF THAW TO AID BEFORE JURY

Large Section of State of New Hampshire Represented Among Witnesses.

TRIAL TO START TUESDAY

What appears to be the last round in Harry Thaw's fight for liberty will begin on Tuesday before Justice Hendrick in the Supreme Court. Thaw will then be tried before a jury to determine whether he is now a sane man. John B. Stanchfield will represent Thaw and Frank A. Cook, Deputy Attorney-General, will appear for New York State, which contends that Thaw is still insane.

Whatever the result of this trial it will undoubtedly be carried to the Court of Appeals of this State, but in all probability the decision on appeal of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court will settle Thaw's fate, since the question at issue is one of fact not of law.

It is said that if the form of verdict in such cases as Thaw's was "guilty, but insane," such a prospect of complete liberty for Thaw would be impossible. But when Thaw was tried for the murder of White the verdict, according to the formula used, was "not guilty, on the ground of insanity." Georgia's Governor Says Prisoner Should Prepare for Death.

ATLANTA, June 18.—The judgment of the court should cause the prisoner to prepare for death," said Gov. Slaton today when he was asked if he had reached a decision in the case of Leo Frank.

The Governor will not be ready, he said, to announce his decision before Monday afternoon, or perhaps Tuesday morning, unless the Executive had so application for a commutation of sentence from execution to life imprisonment.
