

FRENCH STORM METZERAL AND PRESS BEYOND

Occupy That Town and Another, Meaning Double Threat to Colmar.

REGAIN LOST GROUND IN ARGONNE BATTLE

Occupy Trenches on Front of 1,500 Yds. Near Reillon in Lorraine.

PARIS, June 21.—Metzeral, the River Fecht, the Vosges, which was surrounded by the French on Saturday, was taken today by assault, the War Office announced to-night, after the outlying cemetery and the railway station had fallen into the hands of the advancing troops.

Today the War Office reports that in addition to this gain in the advance on Colmar the approaches to the village of Bonhomme have been captured and some of the heights in the neighborhood have been taken. Bonhomme is only about three miles from the French border in Alsace, but it is on another direct road to Colmar, being about the same distance from that city as Metzeral, fifteen miles. The Bonhomme road runs down through the Vosges, through La Foutoye and Kaiserberg, crossing the Fecht about five miles from Colmar, which is on the hill.

There has been little activity in the much fought for ground north of Arras today, but south of the Lorraine border German defence works west of Gouvaux have been occupied. Near Heilou on the entire first line of German trenches has been occupied along a front of 1,500 yards.

In the Argonne at Cheval the Germans used great quantities of asphyxiating shells yesterday which enabled them to capture some of the French trenches. Later, however, they were driven back and the positions were recaptured almost in their entirety.

Four Hangars Set on Fire.

The night communiqué was as follows: In the sector north of Arras the situation remains unchanged. We have held all of the terrain previously conquered. Today there have only been isolated infantry actions, which have not altered the front. The artillery duel continues on the Argonne. We have effectively bombarded the enemy's aviation parks, setting fire to four hangars and destroying two aeroplanes and one captive balloon.

On the western side of the Argonne at Cheval, on the road from Viennesme to Hirtzville, the Germans made a violent attack on Sunday evening after an intense bombardment with asphyxiating shells. Our advanced troops were able to reconquer almost all of our original positions. The battle, an extremely lively one, was entirely local.

On the heights of the Meuse, in the sector of the Calonne trench, after having repulsed several counter attacks made by the enemy, we entered the Calonne trench yesterday. The first attack brought us only a small gain, but the second attack, on the other hand, enabled us to capture new trenches on the east of those which we occupied Sunday. This gain was maintained as were the previous ones.

Lorraine our reconnoitering forces, maintaining contact with the enemy, captured the defence works west of Bonhomme. These works were unoccupied. The Germans in falling back established themselves in a line of trenches south of Leintrey. In Alsace our progress has been continued during the course of the combat, which is without interruption. After having conquered the cemetery and the railway station at Metzeral, immediately afterward we captured the village itself, which we occupied after a very bitter conflict.

We have reached the roads south of this locality and we have advanced our line eastward to a point 500 meters from the outskirts of the village in the direction of Meyerhoff. In these engagements we made additional prisoners, the total since yesterday being more than 500.

North of the Fecht the enemy attempted an attack on our positions at Reihackerkopf and was completely repulsed.


Afternoon Statement.

The afternoon statement was as follows: In the sector to the north of Arras we yesterday made further progress in the direction of Metzeral by the occupation of several trenches and by driving near to the northwest side of the village.

There was an artillery engagement which lasted all night long near Bonhomme, which is to the west of Metzeral. An attack on the part of the enemy, which had been preceded by the explosion of three mines, was repulsed by the fire of our artillery and our infantry.

On the heights of the Meuse, in the sector of the Calonne trenches, we maintained all our gains, in spite of a counter attack of great violence, preceded by a heavy bombardment.

RUSSIANS TO EVACUATE LEMBERG TO SAVE ARMY

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GERMANS CAPTURE LINES IN ARGONNE

Berlin Admits French Gains Near Les Eperages and Luneville.

RUSSIAN DRIVES CHECKED

Berlin, via London, June 21.—The German Staff announced today that the German troops have driven the Russians from the town of Rawa-Ruska, thirty-two miles northwest of Lemberg, and that the Teutonic drive on the latter city proceeds unchecked. The report admits that the Allies have gained several successes in the western front, but that all serious efforts to advance have been checked. The report follows:

In the Western Theatre. On the front to the north of Arras our antagonists resumed themselves chiefly with the fire of artillery. An infantry attack to the north of Sochez was repulsed by us. To the west of Soissons a partial night attack by the French against our positions to the west of Moulins-Toutvent resulted in failure.

On the western border of the Argonne we opened the attack. The Wurttemberg and the North German Landsturm took several lines of defence works situated behind each other over a front of two kilometers (a mile and one-fifth) and inflicted heavy losses on the French. During the unsuccessful counter attack by the French the prisoners and booty taken in this fighting amounted to six officers and 623 men, three machine guns and three mine throwers.

In the Meuse hills the French directed strong attacks last evening against our positions in the trenches to the west of Les Eperages, but at a point to the west of the high road their onslaughts broke down under our fire. To the east of the high road, however, the enemy penetrated into a portion of our positions, but they have been partly driven out again. Seventy prisoners remained in our hands.

On the eastern border of the Argonne our advance posts were pushed back to the west of Luneville. The main positions to the north of Luneville.

In the Vosges attacks of the enemy in the valleys of the Fecht and of the Sauer were repulsed with sanguinary losses. To avoid unnecessary losses we evacuated systematically the villages in the valleys of the Metz and of the Moselle, which had been reduced to a heap of ruins by the French artillery fire.

In the Eastern Theatre. In the region to the northwest of Shavli and to the west of the Upper Dnieper River several Russian attacks were repulsed in part by strong forces, resulted in failure.

In the Southeastern Theatre. The armies under Gen. von Mackensen fighting for Lemberg and Zolkiew have captured Rawa-Ruska, which is in our hands. To the east of Rawa-Ruska the Russian army attacked yesterday by German troops and driven back.

U. S. FIRM IN FRYE CASE. Answer to the German Note Has Been Prepared.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—An answer to the last German note in the case of the American ship William P. Frye, sunk by the German commerce destroyer Prinz Eitel Friedrich last January, has been prepared at the State Department.

The note is now under consideration by the President and it is believed that the President will reach a decision in regard to it before he leaves Washington Wednesday on a short vacation trip.

The United States has proposed to Germany that the case be not sent to a German prize court, as it regards Germany as having admitted her liability to pay damages. This suggestion was not accepted by Germany in her last note on the subject.

It is understood that in the note now in the President's hands the United States adheres to its original position, contending that under the laws of 1828 between the United States and Prussia Germany is liable for the payment of the damages asked, \$229,554, and that prize court proceedings are unnecessary.

The United States is willing to support the claim that this figure represents the actual loss to the owners of the vessel. It was suggested that a settlement might be arranged between the State Department and the German Embassy here.

Germany has set June 26 for the first prize court hearings in the Frye case. The owners of the Frye are Arthur Sewall & Co. of Maine. They have taken no steps to be represented at this hearing, but are leaving their case entirely in the hands of the State Department.

WAR COSTS BRITISH \$15,000,000 A DAY

Chancellor So Announces in Speaking on New \$1,250,000,000 Loan, Out To-day.

DEFICIT IS \$2,500,000,000

LONDON, June 21.—The new British war loan of \$2,500,000,000 (\$1,250,000,000), authorized by the House of Commons last week, will be issued tonight. This was announced today by H. H. Asquith, Chancellor of the Exchequer. The new loan will bear 4 1/2 per cent. interest and will be issued at par. The State retains the right to pay the loan in 1925, but in any case it must be paid in thirty years.
