It is said that from Arras to Souchez the trenches are filled with the dead and that the odor is unbearable. Neutral reports from the front are that the north of Arras may decide the fate of France. Both sides are said to be fighting with unheard of courage.

**GERMANS ADMIT ALSACE REVERSES**

**War Office Statement Says Positions on Fecht Have Been Abandoned.**

BRUSSELS, via Amsterdam, June 22.—Official admission that the French troops are making progress along the Fecht, in Alsace, is made in the War Office announcement issued here to-day. The text of the German official statement follows:

**In the Western Theatre.**

An attack by the enemy on the western bank of the canal to the northwest of Dixmude against three hamlets occupied by our troops has been repulsed. North of Arras there was nothing yesterday beyond artillery fighting. An attack by French infantry at a point south of Neuville was repulsed at midnight. In the champagne district, to the west of Perthes, we pushed forward our positions after successful mining operations. On the heights of the Meuse, hand to hand fighting lasted throughout the day. It was accompanied by heavy artillery fire. At about 3 o'clock this morning we began a counter attack and cleared our trenches almost completely of all the French soldiers who had penetrated there. We took 130 prisoners.

An advance of the enemy at Marcheville in small numbers was easily repulsed. East of Lunville there have been further engagements between advance posts near Leintrey. The Verdun was first attacked by the submarine and then shelled by the enemy. Germany says that the attack was a mistake and offers to pay an indemnity.

# IMMENSE NAVAL FORCE READY, SAYS CHURCHILL

## Former First Lord of the Admiralty Tells Dundee Audience Almost Incredible Additions Will Be Made to the Fleet for the Special Purpose of War.

**Special Correspondence to THE SUN.**

LONDON, June 5.—Winston Churchill, retiring First Lord of the Admiralty, in a remarkable speech to his constituents at Dundee to-day strongly defended his conduct of the Admiralty and made a strong plea for combined action on the part of Englishmen at home to rally to the support of their brothers on sea and land who are fighting the greatest war the world has ever known.

Probably the most striking part of Mr. Churchill's speech was that in which he predicted victory in the Dardanelles, when he said that only a few miles separated the Anglo-French forces from a victory that would have further repercussions than any action heretofore contemplated.

Mr. Churchill in speaking of the great volunteer army that Lord Kitchener has organized, numbering more than 3,000,000 men, declared that if Englishmen could do this, more than America could do in her great civil war, then the British Empire would be able to do anything that it wanted to do. **Against Conscription.**

"And having got so far, being now on the high seas, with 3,000,000 men in the service of the Crown as volunteers, having gone so far, to cast away this great moral advantage which adds to the honor of our arms and to the dignity of our State, simply for the purpose of hustling into the firing line a comparatively small proportion of persons, themselves not picked out by the Government, would be a disgrace to do that after all that has happened in the past."


