

MISS MARIE LOUISE WANAMAKER BECOMES BRIDE OF GURNEE MUNN; MANY DISTINGUISHED GUESTS AT CEREMONY IN PHILADELPHIA



Motion Pictures Are Taken at Church and at Lindenhurst, Where Reception Was Held, in Which Those Attending Wedding Appeared—Many Presents.

PHILADELPHIA, June 28.—In the presence of hundreds of guests from this city, New York, Boston, Washington and other places, Miss Marie Louise Wanamaker, daughter of Rodman Wanamaker and a granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Wanamaker, was married today to Gurnee Munn, son of Mrs. Charles A. Munn of Washington. The Rev. John W. Williams, rector of All Saints' Chapel, Chelsea, N. J., performed the ceremony, which took place at noon in St. Mark's Protestant Episcopal Church and was followed by a reception and breakfast at Lindenhurst, the country place of John Wanamaker, near Jenkintown.

Handsome gifts of great variety and value were received by the bride and groom, which started exactly at noon. The bride's father, the bride and bridegroom were particularly interested also in the gift from President Wilson, a gold and amethyst pin.

The bride, who was a debutante of the season which is just closing, was one of the fairest of the year's brides, and was beautiful as a bride. The wedding party also seemed to have been chosen for its good looks and St. Mark's church has seldom held a more notable assemblage.

Long before the time of the wedding ceremony, which started exactly at noon, the church began to fill with the hundreds of guests. The wedding party formed in the hallway leading from the choir room to the church.

The bride and bridegroom received the guests in the salon, and then when the reception was over and the guests had adjourned to about a hundred small tables on the lawn went to the breakfast room overlooking the portico on the south side of the house, where the bridal breakfast was served.

At Lindenhurst a different scene met the eyes of the guests and the bride and groom. Virtually everything was pink. Pink rambler roses, which adorn the decorations, in profusion, were the principal decorations.

Newberry of Detroit. The bride is of Colonial stock on the paternal side, with a strain of Spanish blood, accounting for her rare beauty. She is a grandniece of Col. R. H. I. Goddard, father of the Marquis d'Andigne and cousin of Mrs. C. Oliver Iselin of New York.

The ceremony took place on the lawn under a crescent shaped marquee of pine boughs and pink gladioli. The Rev. James P. Conover of Concord, N. H., and Daniel Godwin of East Greenwich officiated.

METUCHEN, N. J., June 28.—The marriage of Miss Elsie Mook Burroughs, daughter of Edward Burroughs, to Francis Marmaduke Potter, son of Dr. and Mrs. Ellis F. Potter, took place in the Metuchen Reformed Church at 8 o'clock tonight. The Rev. John W. Van Zanten officiated.

Mr. Potter is principal of Voorhees College, Vellore, South India, an institution under the jurisdiction of the Reformed Church of America. He was graduated from Rutgers College in 1908. He won a Rhodes scholarship and finished his course at Oxford, receiving a B. A. degree in 1911. His acquaintance with Miss Burroughs began when the two were classmates in the Metuchen High School. He came all the way from India to join the wedding.

While the guests were arriving the organist, Miss Kelly Jackson, played selections from Lohengrin and Mendelssohn. The church was decorated with honey-suckle, pink rambiers and wild flowers, the altar being banked with palms and the pews marked with clusters of lilies of the valley.

The Lohengrin march was played as the bride approached the altar, accompanied by her father. Miss Burroughs wore white liberty satin trimmed with chintilly lace and seed pearls, with a veil of lace caught up with orange blossoms. The maid of honor, Miss Ruth Burroughs, sister of the bride, wore pink crepe de chine with a pink and white picture hat. The bridesmaids were the Misses Madeline Hall and Edith Crehore. They wore frocks of pale pink tulle with picture hats to match. Nell Campbell Potter, brother of the bridegroom, was best man. The ushers were Edward Allen Burroughs, brother of the bride, Edward C.
