

VOTERS STILL TO CHOOSE ALL STATE'S JUDGES

Constitutional Convention Not Expected to Change Present System.

MAY DIVIDE WORK OF APPELLATE DIVISION

ALBANY, July 10.—It has been practically decided that the organization of the court of appeals, so far as the present constitutional convention is concerned, will remain as it is at present and that all judges in the State shall continue to be elected.

The various expressions of opinion upon this question have been sifted to a conclusion in favor of continuing the election of judges in this State. The present court of appeals comprises seven elective judges and three justices of the supreme court assigned to service on the court of appeals.

It is largely because of the calibre of these three justices that it has been determined not to provide for ten elected judges for the court of appeals, but to continue the designation of three supreme court justices in order that the governor can have the pick of the best three of all the supreme court justices in the State.

100 Amendments in Hand. The convention committee on the judiciary has finished its public hearings and has begun its executive sessions. About 100 proposed amendments have been referred to this committee, involving almost every particular of the judiciary article of the constitution.

Whether or not there shall be a review of the decisions of the latter body is a public question and involves other and larger questions than merely the rights of A vs. B as litigants. As one member put it, "The Appellate Division should be courts of justice. The court of appeals is a court of law."

Appellate Division Problem. Whether or not this conception of the functions of these courts will prevail cannot be determined until the judiciary committee brings in its report on the judiciary article. A great many country practitioners are of the opinion that they have a right to appeal to the highest court, but the recognition of such a claim would involve a breakdown of the court of appeals, or what many lawyers regard as its equivalent, namely, the separation of that tribunal into two parts or divisions.

85,000 TOILERS TO GO ON STRIKE HERE TO-MORROW. Dissatisfied Clothing Workers May Be Joined by Garment Makers Union, Swelling Total in Walk-out to 160,000—Wages Chief Issue.

A general strike of 85,000 workers in the men's clothing industry here has been ordered. It will be started to-morrow morning when 9,000 members of the Pants Makers Union will quit work. Then all of the other branches of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America will walk out.

President Benjamin Schlesinger of the International Ladies Garment Workers' Union announced yesterday that a general strike of the cloakmakers was probable, although action would be deferred until the result of a Mayor's conference on conciliation could be learned.

MAIL CAR ROBBERS GOT \$110,000 TIP

Had Inside Information of Shipment From Reserve Bank in Atlanta. MADE JEWELRY HAUL

NEW ORLEANS, July 10.—The quartet of bandits who held up the New Orleans Limited train of the Louisville and Nashville Railroad near Greenville, Ala., early this morning and rifled registered packages on the mail car of currency whose total is said to run into six figures had positive tips from some inside source concerning the shipment of more than \$100,000 worth of cash from Atlanta to a bank in Houston, Tex.

The Federal authorities are reticent concerning the amount of the booty obtained by the bandits, but information from apparently reliable sources indicates that the masked robbers got a large sum of currency and several packages of valuable jewelry. Unofficial estimates of the booty range from \$50,000 to more than \$100,000.

The bandits who held up the L. & N. train early today made no effort to conceal the fact that they expected to reap a rich haul in procuring the Houston pouch, supposed to contain a shipment of \$100,000 in currency from the Federal Reserve Bank in Atlanta to member banks in the Texas city.
