

VOTE TO DAVON NEW STATE BUDGET PLAN

Proposal to Let Governor Initiate Appropriations Argued in Convention.

MANY FAVOR SCHEME

ALBANY, Aug. 10.—The new plan by which the Governor instead of the Legislature will initiate the State budget was outlined to-day by Henry L. Stimson, chairman of the finance committee, which drafted it. Under its terms the Legislature may eliminate or increase the amount appropriated. The convention will vote on the plan to-morrow.

COMPTROLLER SHOULD ACT

"The budget should be made in the Comptroller's office from estimates made by the heads of State departments and sent to the Governor, who would then call upon the heads of those departments to become acquainted with the figures of these departments instead of leaving it to some clerk as now."

Should Be Amended.

"The plan of the finance committee," returned Mr. Smith, "simply constitutionalizes the present methods of framing the annual budget, except the initial step is transferred from the Legislature to the Governor. This bill should be amended to require a two-thirds vote in each house upon all appropriations and legislative grants, as these applications are not included in the budget prepared by the Governor."

RIGGS BANK HAS NEW COMPLAINT OF M'ADOO

Abuse of Franking Privilege in Mailing Copies of Suit Records Charged.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—A formal charge may be made by the attorney of the Riggs National Bank in Washington that Treasury officers have abused the franking and free printing privilege by having had struck off at the Government printing office as a public document and circulated through the mails to various Government bank copies of portions of the record in the Riggs bank case.

NEW OFFICIALS WANTED.

Haytians Would Dissolve Both Legislative Bodies.

PORT AU PRINCE, Aug. 10.—If the National Assembly meets next Thursday to elect a President of Hayti it is believed that Gen. Dartigneville will be elected in spite of the feeling against him. The people, it is believed, would prefer to have the Chamber of Deputies and the Senate dissolved, a provisional government established and an entirely new election.

The treasury service of the republic has been handed back to the International Bank by the American authorities in control at Port au Prince.

Marines Start for Hayti.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 10.—Cruising 352 marines of the United States cruiser Tennessee sailed from the Philadelphia navy yard to-day for Hayti. The marines will reinforce those now in Hayti under command of Rear Admiral Caperton. The Tennessee carries enough supplies for a three months campaign.

FUSION FOR JUDGES URGED.

Lawyers Want All Parties to Aid in Election of Two.

The reelection of Supreme Court Justices Clarke and Greenbaum by concerted effort of Republicans, Democrats and Progressives is urged by a number of well known lawyers who have organized the Non-Partisan Judiciary Committee.

THROUGH BAGGAGE UPHELD.

Carriers Forbidden to Change Rules on Combination Tickets.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—The Interstate Commerce Commission handed down a decision to-day forbidding carriers from putting into operation proposed rules prohibiting the through checking of baggage and the sale of through parlor or sleeping car tickets on combination railroad tickets.

TIFFANY FAIR EXHIBIT LOOTED.

Gems Valued at \$5,000 Stolen in San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 10.—Five thousand dollars worth of jewels were stolen from the exhibit of Tiffany & Co. in the Palace of Mines and Metallurgy at the exposition early this morning.

Richard K. Powers of Sterling, Mass., New England's Oldest Citizen.

STERLING, MASS., Aug. 10.—New England's oldest citizen, Richard K. Powers of Sterling, who had the distinction of voting at eighty-two State elections and for twenty-one Presidents, died here to-day at the home of his daughter-in-law, Mrs. George Powers, at the age of 104 years. Mr. Powers, who enjoyed the best of health up to ten days ago, conducted a large farm near the town of Sterling, where he was born November 26, 1810.
