BIG FIELD TO PLAY FOR NATIONAL TITLE

Entry List for Tournament at Detroit Contains Names of 138 Golfers.

SEVERAL STARS MISSING

The list of entries for the national amateur golf championship which begins on Saturday at Detroit was announced yesterday by Howard F. Whitcomb, secretary of the United States Golf Association. The list, which includes the names and starting times for the preliminary qualifying round on Saturday, contains 138 names. This number has been exceeded only once since the rule restricting entries to golfers on the national handicap list went into effect. At Garden City in 1913 there were 147 entrants.

Of course the three favorites, Jerome D. Travis, national open champion; Francis Ouimet, national amateur champion, and Charles Evans, Jr., Western amateur champion, have entered, but there are a number of other golfers with low ratings on the national handicap list who have not sent in their names. The first of a series of three races in which yachts of eight classes competed was sailed yesterday on Gravesend Bay. It was the first open regatta of the Atlantic Yacht Club's race week, and was a most successful one, as a moderate wind from the south favored the yachts and enabled them to make good time over the different courses. There were thirty-eight starters, and the longest course selected by the committee was about and then home, seventeen miles. The next division was in Bensonhurst, Fort Hamilton, Buoy 15 and home, twice around, or 12.6 miles, and the smaller classes sailed a shorter triangle of 7.3 miles in all. John R. Brophy and S. L. Finlay were the members of the committee, and they pressed into service C. A. Kelly of the Crescent Athletic Club, who was more prominent with the starting and finishing gun.

The preparatory signal sounded at 1:30 o'clock, and ten minutes later the New York Yacht Club's regatta was sent off. E. F. Luckenbach sailed the Alerian and had the nearest position at the start, with Alerian next and Alice in third. The Alerian took the lead early in the race and held it until the finish, winning by 1 minute 29 seconds from the Oke. Alerian was last.

The Alice led the Virginia at the start in the Q class and held the lead all over the course, winning by 42 seconds. These yachts are sailing for the Thompson trophy.

There were sixteen starters in the Star class and as usual they got away well bunched, with the Little Dipper having a slight advantage and Alerian second.
