

BODIES FOUND IN F-4; CREW FEARED PERIL

Defects in Batteries of Submarine, Report Shows, Had Been Revealed.

THREE OTHER F BOATS OF SIMILAR DESIGN

The 22 Men Who Lost Their Lives Had Been Warned by Previous Accidents.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—The bodies of several members of the crew of the United States submarine F-4, which sank in Honolulu harbor on March 25, have been located in the wreckage according to a despatch received at the Navy Department this evening from Rear Admiral Boush, in charge of the board of naval officers examining the hull of the submarine. The despatch, sent at 10:30 o'clock this morning, said that the bodies of three of the crew members were found in the wreckage of the submarine. The bodies were found in the forward compartment of the submarine, which had been inaccessible.

Alphonse Pegoud.

Alphonse Pegoud, who probably held more records for French aviators than any other man, has frequently been mentioned since the war began for his daring work in the air. Last March he was awarded the Military Medal for his bravery and the value of his work.

Pegoud was generally spoken of as the original upside down flier. He had planned to come to this country to give exhibition flights. At the time of his departure he was, however, dissuaded, so his managers said, because Orville Wright demanded to get a cash bonus.

Only a few days ago Pegoud returned to the French lines after a flight of 180 miles in German territory with ninety-seven bullet holes in the wings of his machine.

Almost endless stories are told of the daring feats performed by Pegoud since the war began. He has been captured in sight of a German ammunition depot and dropped nine bombs on it. The air concussion
