**FOOTBALL CODE NOW  
LONGER A PUZZLER**

Interpretation Meeting Finds Little to Clarify in 1915 Rules.

**CAMP LEADS DISCUSSION**

The intercollegiate football rules committee and its special board of codifiers performed the task of presenting the 1915 playing rules so well this year that last evening's annual "interpretation" meeting for the officials and coaches, which was held at the Biltmore, brought out far fewer knotty points than usual. A few changes were made in the code in the last few years that the officials and coaches have a very thorough understanding of the rules governing the game, and the interpretation made by the central board last night affected only a few very minor points.

**Ten Cent Evening  
Provided by Feds**

THE problem of a man with nothing to spend but a dime and the evening has been solved for him by the Brooklyn Federal League club. Night baseball will be offered at Washington Park in the last series of the year, with Buffalo, on September 29 and 30 and October 1 and 2—also, perhaps, all next season. Work was started yesterday morning on five steel towers 80 feet high, with concrete bases, 13 feet in diameter, each of which will bear powerful electric lights of a new type. One will be at the end of each foul line, one just away from each coach's box and one in deep center field. It is hoped also that night football games may be obtained for the coming gridiron season.

NATIONAL CHAMPION**

Holds Double Crown Won by Mrs. H. Arnold Jackson One Year Ago.

**MRS. GAVIN BEATEN 3-2**

LAKE FOREST, Sept. 11.—Mrs. Clarence H. Vanderbeck of Philadelphia won the women's golf championship of the United States today by beating Mrs. W. A. Gavin of England by 3 up and 2 to play in the final round of the tourney which began on Monday at the Owentons Club. The victory puts Mrs. Vanderbeck on the same pedestal which was occupied by Mrs. H. Arnold Jackson of Boston last year, for the Philadelphia woman now is the holder of both the national and Eastern titles. As the national championship is decided by match play and the Eastern championship is a medal play test, the golfer who wins them both demonstrates her worth in both phases of the royal and ancient game. Mrs. Jackson did it last year, and now Mrs. Vanderbeck has followed in her footsteps.
