

POLITICAL SLAYER
WOULD STAY IN U.S.

Sichinsky, Twice Convicted of Killing Galician Governor, Surrenders Himself.

WANTS STATUS DEFINED

Miroslav Sichinsky, who says he is the Ruthenian student who shot Count Andrzej Pototsky, Governor of Galicia, on April 12, 1908, and who escaped from an Austrian prison in 1911, surrendered to United States Commissioner Frederick C. Howe at Ellis Island as a political prisoner yesterday.

Twice Convicted of Crime.

The shooting of Count Pototsky caused a sensation in Austria. It was the result of political strife between the Polish aristocracy and the Ruthenian peasantry. When Sichinsky was placed on trial, according to Mr. Pollock, he was defended by the Ukrainian Deputies in Parliament. He was convicted and sentenced to death. The verdict was upset on appeal and a new trial was granted. He was again found guilty and condemned to die. So great was the demand by Ukrainian organizations in Austria, the United States and Canada for a commutation of his sentence that Emperor Francis Joseph saved his life and commuted the sentence to twenty years imprisonment.

At the beginning of the European war he returned to Austria as a correspondent for a Norwegian newspaper and was arrested, but his Norwegian passport saved him. He returned to Sweden and eight months ago came to this country.

Indictment Reveals Politics.

The Austrian indictment against Sichinsky, it is said, recites the strife between the Polish aristocracy and the peasantry and even defends the political character of the crime. It states that he was a member of the "Black Legion" and that he had been in contact with the "Black Legion" in the United States. FIFTY HAYTIANS AND ONE AMERICAN DIE IN BATTLE

One Brooklyn and Two New Jersey Marines Are Wounded by Guerrillas—Caperton's Forces Drive Natives to Hills.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—The most serious fighting between American forces and Haytiens since the occupation of Haiti was reported to the Navy Department to-day by Rear Admiral Caperton. One American marine, Sergt. John Platt, was killed. Ten other marines were wounded. Only one of the wounded, Corporal George W. Strout, is reported seriously injured. More than fifty Haytiens were killed.

Two engagements occurred, one at Haut du Cap, near Cape Haytien, and the other between Petit Riviere and Delartibonite. In the former ten marines were wounded, while in the fighting at the latter place Sergt. Platt was killed. Both engagements were due to the interference of Haytian guerrillas with the food supplies of Cape Haytien and other important coast towns. Mounted American patrols were attacked by the cacos, as the roving bands of guerrillas are called.

Admiral Caperton states that all the caco forces were driven into the hills and that the sources of food supplies are now open to the towns.

Officials here maintain absolute confidence in Admiral Caperton and the officers under him in Haiti. They are satisfied that the measures adopted by the Admiral for maintaining order have been justified and that they are only such as were imperative for the safety of the Americans and the protection of the Haytiens themselves. The cacos are regarded as little more than bandits who are fighting for no cause except their own interests.

Official Report of Fights.

The official announcement of the fighting as made by the Navy Department to-day was:

During the forenoon of Saturday, September 25, a patrol was sent to Haut du Cap and during the afternoon a patrol was sent to Petit-Anse, both of which settlements are within a short distance of Cape Haytien and on the main lines of supply to that city.

Both patrols passed caco outposts, whose commanders demurred against the movements of the American forces but offered no resistance to their passage. On Sunday morning, September 26, patrols were again sent out. Patrols were ordered to push through, to take no offensive action, but to defend themselves if attacked.

The first patrol to Haut du Cap met numerous caco outposts, but advanced without resistance. About 8:30 A. M., however, firing began general in the vicinity of Haut du Cap and both patrols engaged. Reinforcements from Cape Haytien were sent. As a result of the conflict it is estimated that about fifty cacos were killed and about ten marines wounded.

Admiral Caperton reports that the sending out of these patrols is necessary to insure the entry of food and supplies to Cape Haytien. American forces returned to Cape Haytien at 6 P. M. Sunday, having cleared away all interference with supplies from Haut du Cap.

A later despatch informed the Department that cacos had been committed to the hills.

DENIES ARMENIAN MASSACRE

Ambassador Bernstorff Thinks Victims Are "Pure Inventions."

BOSTON, Sept. 27.—Count von Bernstorff, the German Ambassador, declares in a letter written on September 23 that the reports of the slaughter of Armenians by the Turks "appear to be pure inventions." Writing to Miran Sevasly of Boston, chairman of the Executive committee of the National Defence Union of America, the Count says:

"In reply to your letter I beg to inform you that according to recent official and authentic reports received by the German Government and transmitted by the Embassy to the Government of the United States, the alleged atrocities committed in the Ottoman Empire appear to be pure inventions.

"Without doubting the good faith of the Catholics, I beg, however, to call your attention to the fact that His Holiness is writing under pressure of the Russian censure.

It was recently reported that the Armenians were being exterminated under direction of the Turkish Government.

STEAMER SUNK NEAR CRETE.

Submarine Sinks British Ship Natal Transport.

MARSEILLES, Sept. 27.—A German submarine on September 17 shelled and sank the British steamship Natal Transport south of Crete. It was announced here to-day that the crew of thirty-four was picked up and landed at the Piraeus, Greece, whence they were brought here by the liner Memphis.

The Natal Transport had a displacement of 2,665 tons. She was last reported to have arrived at Port Said on July 15.
