

QUEENS REGULARS WIN. Reform Democrats Beaten for Every Office—The Nominations.

In Queens the regular Democratic organization won against the opposition led by James H. Hicks, who was beaten in the fight for the nomination for Sheriff by Paul Stiles.

The Republicans and Progressives nominated George Goret for County Clerk. The fight between Theron H. Burden and Charles A. McArdle for the Republican and Progressive nomination for Assembly and Aldermen in Queens followed.

Two tie votes were recorded in Queens both in fights for county committee. In the Twenty-ninth Election district of the Third Assembly district, the Ridgewood district, Herman Gohlberg, the present leader, and John H. McCarron were tied for county committee at 81 votes each. In the Tenth Election district of the Fourth Assembly district (Jamaica), County Clerk Leonard Baruff and Peter Albrecht tied with vote of 84 to 84.

John J. Fitzgerald easily defeated Robert Stewart for the Democratic nomination for Supreme Court Justice, and Stephen Callaghan, Republican, was over John R. Taylor, Progressive, in the Bull Moose primary.

Mayor Lunn, Socialist, Wins. SENECAVILLE, Sept. 28.—Partial returns from the primaries show that Dr. George R. Lunn, Socialist candidate for Mayor, won today.

The bitter fight that has been waged against him petered out. Lunn is considered a stronger candidate than ever as a result of his defeat of his party enemies.

THE REPUBLICAN AND DEMOCRATIC CONTESTS did not involve this year the question of either County or Assembly district leadership and there was almost complete elimination of party factional strife.

The most interesting feature in the primaries was the invasion of the Progressive camp by the regular Republican and Democratic candidates. Almost all along the line in the tickets the names of those candidates appeared alongside as rivals for the Bull Moose nominations.

The Progressive leaders were especially anxious to appear at the meetings for adopting the party platform after refusing all negotiations for a fusion, and made special efforts to do it.

The regular Republican and Democratic headquarters up to midnight indicated that Callaghan, the Republican candidate for Supreme Court, would capture the Bull Moose nomination from Taylor for the party candidate, and also that County, the Republican candidate for District Attorney, would defeat Robert H. Hiltner.

DEFEATS STEWART 1,270 TO 321 IN Supreme Court Race. MISKOTA, I., Sept. 28.—There was little or no excitement at the preferential primaries held throughout Nassau county today when 25 per cent of the voters turned out to name their candidates for office. The only contest was between John J. Fitzgerald and Robert Stewart, candidates for the Democratic nomination for Justice of the Peace, and 1,270 votes for Stewart and 321 for Fitzgerald.

THOMAS A. McWHINNEY, a Progressive Assemblyman, is again the candidate on the Republican ticket. He had no opposition. George H. Kentshman will be the candidate on the Democratic ticket. He also had no opposition.

RIVERHEAD, I., Sept. 28.—Late indications in Suffolk county estimate that Congressman John J. Fitzgerald of Brooklyn carried the Democratic primaries in Suffolk county for Justice of the Peace Court by a large majority over Robert Stewart, also of Brooklyn.
