REPEATS HUSBAND'S COMPLAINTS

Did Mr. Mitchell ever tell you anything about his wife? Mrs. Mitchell, Herman L. Roth, Mrs. Austin's attorney, asked. "Yes, he told me they were unhappy and that things were disagreeable at La Muette de Portici when the summer but that his wife preferred to stay out until 3 or 4 o'clock in the morning to dance and drink. He said he left home because there was war all the time. I never went out with Mr. Mitchell alone until he told me he had separated from his wife."

WIFE TOLD TO GO TO MOTHER

"My wife couldn't become reconciled to my ideas for a more moderate scale of living and told me she intended to have her own way. She kept on with her rapid social life, making it necessary on many occasions for me to go to my office with only three hours sleep. Finally I told her I must have a night's rest occasionally and she had better go home to her mother because I couldn't keep pace with her. When the final separation came I had a long talk and as a result she looked her door and I left the hotel."
