

The French of Katchank the Serbians attacked a column which had advanced, but were repulsed.

In the course of the pursuit of the enemy, captured two mountain guns with large quantities of ammunition. Thus far we have found in Ustup 10,000 rifles of various patterns, 250 cases of powder, 15,000 cases of cartridges and large quantities of other war materials.

The Times correspondent at Athens telegraphs that the British expeditionary force has had its first engagement on the Chechel-Deiran front, near Strumitsa. The British force is still lacking, but its present position would indicate that the Allies intend making a strong counter move against Bulgaria from the southwest, with Strumitsa as their first goal.

No further news has been received of the Russian force, estimated at 200,000 men, which is supposed to be trying to effect a landing on the Bulgarian Black Sea coast.

The Corriere della Sera of Milan prints a despatch from Bucharest saying that the third Bulgarian army, which was destroyed, with the exception of only fifty men, in the desperate fighting between the Bulgarians and the Serbians at Timok Vatoz. The correspondent adds that the wounded fill the public buildings and barracks at Vidin, Bulgaria. He states that 20,000 Serbians from the line of war have been taken refuge in Rumania.

A Havas Agency despatch from Athens quotes a Constantinian report to the effect that the first division of Turkish reserves, which were sent from the Gallipoli peninsula and sent to Bulgarian Thrace. The correspondent adds that the Bulgarian Government has called all existing divisions of the army 1855 to 1904 to the colors, and the only chance is not desperate.

A Sofia despatch received here today by way of Berlin and Copenhagen says that 50,000 French and 20,000 British troops have already been landed at Salonica and that the disembarkation continues.

The present situation of Serbia is described as desperate by Col. Repington, the Times military correspondent. In an interview given to the Giornale d'Italia of Rome, the Italian newspaper quotes Col. Repington as saying that the only chance of safety for the Serbians is to be completely isolated as it is, to retire to the Adriatic coast, outside the territory where the Austrians and German military movements are at least as likely to supply it with food and munitions.

In the view of the military correspondent of the Allies advancing from Salonica cannot arrive in time to save Serbia, while, he says, the Austrians and Germans can be in Constantinople within a week. While the situation is so grave, the situation in the Near East, Col. Repington expresses the belief that whatever happens the Allies will win through the eventual exhaustion of Germany.

SHELL VARNA ARSENAL.

Russian Torpedo Boats Cross the Mine Fields Safely.

LONDON, Nov. 2.—The Daily Mail's correspondent at Bucharest, telegraphing under date of October 30, says: "During the bombardment of Varna the Marine Corps, the marine arsenal, and an English cotton factory in the vicinity of the mine fields were destroyed or damaged. None of the Russian ships was sunk. Russian torpedo boats entered the roadstead through the mine field and the German planes cooperated with good results.

LATEST reports from the Balkan theatre of war say that the Austro-German forces have taken the Serbian arsenal of Krugujevac, and are advancing southward, while the Bulgarians are bombarding the outer forts of Nish. Bulgarian efforts to drive the French expeditionary force from positions along the Vardar River are said to have met with complete failure, the French literally driving the Bulgarians into the river. Paris also reports that the French have dislodged the Bulgarians from positions around Kuprili, although not from the town itself. The British force had its first action in the Balkan war zone near Strumitsa, which place is believed to be the starting point for an invasion of Bulgaria.
