ANTIS ARE EXULTANT, BUT WILL WORK ON

Showing of Suffrage in New York Will Cause Opponents to Keep Headquarters Open—To Fight Congressional Amendment Next.

From claims that "we have won everything," voiced early yesterday evening by one hundred or more prominent anti-suffragists gathered at the headquarters of the New York State Association Opposed to Woman Suffrage...

Close in Some Counties. It was close in Fulton-Hamilton and in Nassau, and there were several other counties where the anti's vote was nothing to brag about.

But all in all, up-State and down-State, the anti-suffragists are glad that New York is by no means ready to admit women to an equal share with men in the rights of the ballot.

Generally regarded, the sweep against suffrage displayed about the same tendencies and characteristics as New York and Massachusetts; about the same strength in little communities and thickly populated cities.

First Figures Saddening. The little post village of Acushnet, in Bristol county, Massachusetts, supplies the first suffrage returns received in the three States, and the figures were not very cheering.

Badly Beaten Early. In this State it was apparent at a very early hour that suffrage was badly beaten. The first returns received from the greater city came from two election districts in the city of New York.

City Suffrage Vote. Returns at midnight indicate defeat by about 30,000. The returns in the suffrage vote early this morning indicated that Greater New York would roll up a majority of more than 95,000 against the amendment.


STANLEY LOOKS LIKE VICTOR IN KENLUCKY

But Republican Nominee for Governor Claims He Will Win Close Vote. MURPHEY AHEAD IN TOLEDO. Sheen's Captor Has Probably Been Elected Mayor.

LEWISTON, Ky., Nov. 2.—Ex-Governor O. Stanley, Democrat, was probably elected Governor in this State today over E. P. Morrow, Republican, by a safe lead. Stanley had the backing of President Wilson, who wrote a letter praising his work.

With eight-three counties reported Stanley had a plurality of 12,000 over Morrow. The race is the closest since the Campbell-Taylor election in 1899. Both parties claim the vote was well organized by the Republican organization and running on a non-partisan basis.

DEMOCRATS WIN WHOLE STATE TICKET, BUT SOCIALISTS GAIN. JACKSON, Miss., Nov. 2.—Theodore B.
