Yale Cheering Is Checked.

The goal was kicked and Princeton led, 7 points to 0.

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LOSES U. S. JOB FOR COUNCILSING WILSON WOOING

Assistant Postmaster Said President Should Have Waited a Year.

DISRESPECT CHARGED; DENIED AN APPEAL.

CHICAGO, Nov. 13.—George Burkitt, for six years first Assistant Postmaster at Winnetka, has been discharged from the Government service on the ground of "disloyalty to the President." He is alleged to have made the remark that President Wilson should have waited longer after the death of his wife before becoming engaged to Mrs. Galt.

Remember His Words.

Mr. Burkitt did not keep a copy of his reply to the President, but he quoted what he could remember of it, as follows: "I replied to him in the nearest words I could remember and as follows: I acknowledged that in a general conversation with a man through the window that in answer to a question I made the remark that I thought that any one should wait at least a year before marrying and in line with that thought that the President should too."

Card Index of Spies.

"Every Central Empire spy operating in this country to-day is officially listed in the offices of these men and their records are kept in card index form. These are: Louis B. Spy Trail Is Leading Up to Diplomatic Agents

Identity of Teutonic Plotters' Backers Likely to Be Revealed at Conspiracy Trials—Dr. Gorica Makes Fresh Charges Against Austrians.

3,000 IN ESPIONAGE WORK HERE, HE SAYS

Secret service investigation of the activities of Teutonic spies in this country is reported to have definitely established the connection of diplomatic and consular agents with the system, and revelations along this line are expected to be made at the trials of the men accused as bomb conspirators.

COST OF ESPIONAGE HERE IS STAGGERING, SAYS GORICA

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Nov. 13.—The Providence Journal will say to-morrow: "In a vigorous reply to the denials of the Austrian Embassy and several Austro-Hungarian Consuls that they had been fomenting trouble in munitions plants and constantly intruding with spies and secret agents, Dr. Joseph Gorica made the following statement last night: 'Did anybody expect that these men were going to acknowledge the facts? I can simply give my word of honor that what I have said is the truth and that the facts are going to be proved to the satisfaction of the American people.'"

Russian Spy Charge Denied.

"I also desire to call attention to the fact that if I had been a traitor to my country my Government gave me a splendid opportunity to present to Russia the most important secrets of its activities two days prior to the declaration of war, when, on July 26, 1914, I was sent from Warsaw by the Consul-General to Vienna with secret despatches of the utmost importance, and carried them in my pocket until my arrival in Vienna on the night of the 27th, when I was received in the Foreign Office by Count Istoczy, an expert in all matters of Foreign Affairs. What an opportunity if I had really been a traitor to my country!"
