

FORD HIRES PEACE SHIP; GIVES \$20,000 TO FIGHT DEFENCE

Charts Liner Oscar II. to Carry Pacifists Who Will "End War by Xmas."

PLANS FOR CONGRESS IN NEUTRAL COUNTRY

Henry Ford has chartered a ship and will lead it with as many distinguished Americans as possible and set sail for a neutral part of Europe on December 4.

Mrs. Ford May Go Too

Mr. Ford said he thought Mrs. Ford would accompany him. He hoped Mrs. Edson would go, too.

What President Wilson thinks of the project Mr. Ford says he will tell later. He is not repeating the President's attitude now is that the project with him have not been concluded.

2,000 U. S. AIRCRAFT URGED BY HAMMOND

Young Inventor Returns on La Touraine After Studying War Conditions.

RIDICULES FORD'S PLAN

John Hays Hammond, Jr., radio expert and inventor of wireless devices to control torpedoes, arrived last night on the French liner La Touraine from an eight weeks trip abroad. He said the object of his voyage was to find out how the unpreparedness of the Allies chiefly affected them.

"Aeroplane are among our greatest needs," Mr. Hammond continued. "We should have 2,000 at a minimum that might be sent into the air at a moment's notice. That means that we must have 2,000 pilots for engineering and observers. This would be for land purposes alone."

DANIELS WILL STICK TO BABY SUBMARINES

SEES U. S. SUPPLY OF STEEL CUT OFF IN WAR. Editor's Views on Loss of Ore Fields Bring Letters From Wilson and T. R.

Edmonds, editor of the Manufacturers Record, express deep interest in the presentation which Mr. Edmonds made recently to the effect that national preparedness would be an impossibility under existing iron and steel conditions.
