

Penn Succumbs to Cornell After Stubborn Fight in First Three Quarters--Columbia Crushes Wesleyan

CORNELL BEATS PENN, BUT HAS NO WALKOVER

Champion Football Team of East Behind by 9 to 7 Until Near Finish.

LAST QUARTER SPURT MAKES SCORE 24 TO 9

Barrett Dominant Figure in Every Way--Tallies 17 Points for Victors.

FORWARD PASSES OF QUAKERS PUZZLE FOE

New Defence Against Them Works in Second Half--Fumbles Count.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 25.—The Cornell football team, at the top of the Eastern heap, stayed there this afternoon by winning its game with University of Pennsylvania at Franklin Field. The score was 24 to 9. It was the final game of the year for Cornell and the big Red eleven gave home its claim to supremacy by making the last of its unbroken chain of victories a decisive one.

The teams battled into the last quarter with the outlook very dubious for the Cornellians, for the Quakers led at 9 to 7 when the third period ended. Then the Ithacans, a strong second half team all season, rallied as in their wont when points must be had and jumped into a safe lead with two touchdowns and a goal from the field.

Penn Proves Stubborn Foe. Penn was beaten, but it was no smooth and primrose romp for the Ithacans. The much harried and much thumped Quakers made a fine fight against a better eleven and gave as good as they received, sometimes a shade more, for three-fourths of the game.

Barrett, the kingpin, Cornell captain and meteoric performer, contributed greatly to Cornell's success by his individual operations that filled a versatile and flow of Cornell's fortunes as the tussle carried the hostile groups from point to point in wide a repeated geographical change of location.

Monster Point Sets Quakers Back. At the outset a monster punt by Barrett drove the ball close to Penn's goal and at once set the Quakers on the back. His punting helped hold Penn back until he crossed over for a touchdown, although Penn made strong and well managed resistance in the meantime and kept the Cornellians to use up a good deal of energy.

Fumble by Barrett gave Penn an opening from which a touchdown eventuated, and an instance of bad judgment by the Cornell side, which was the result in his own territory, put the Quakers in position for their goal from the field. That forward pass was a boomerang. It went askew. It was intercepted. In the final and most exciting period Barrett ran forty-two yards for a touchdown, intercepted a forward pass and opened the way to a touchdown by Shiverick and blocked the desperate Quakers for the rest of the time by holding their forward passes and their outside kicks.

Penney Kept on with the good work. Barrett made a poor kickoff to Henning and the Quakers worked the ball ten yards further with a forward pass. Williams journeyed five yards with the ball, a forward pass was incomplete and Bell pointed to Cornell's 18 yard line. Hawley was eased into the attack at this juncture and lost no time in earning his spot. On an end around evolution he slipped eleven yards, then after Barrett had pointed to Cornell's 44 yard line, Barrett intercepted a forward pass and punted to Bell, who was nailed by Shelton on Penn's 25 yard line. Barrett nudged a return punt to Cornell's 33 yard line and Penn recovered.

Hawley missed his first try for a field goal, but when Barrett punted from the 20 yard line, Rockefeller caught it and set the Penn crowd delirious with a kicking spring to Cornell's 23 yard line. The time was getting short, so Hawley stepped back to the 34 yard line and waited the leather over the cross bar. The half ended with Penn leading, 9 to 7.

Henning, Hopkins, H. Miller and Nell in the line and Derr and Rockefeller in the back field stood out by excellent defensive work and Derr distinguished himself with his all around chasing. Cornell worked with the ball, hit the foe powerfully and worked at high pressure from first to last. Loucks, a substitute, got into the game late and struck up excitement with his dashing runs on catching punts.
