

JUAREZ GIVES UP; GARRANZA TAKES CHIHUAHUA CITY

Garrison of Border Post Takes Oath—Villa Still in Mountains. EX-LEADER'S RELATIVES LEAVE FOR HAVANA

EL PASO, Tex., Dec. 22.—Juarez was formally turned over to the Carranza Government this morning. At the same time the city of Chihuahua was taken into the hands of Gen. Jacinto Trevino.

Gen. Alvaro Obregon, commander of the Carranza forces, reached here from the west to-night to take charge of the Juarez garrison.

Gen. Francisco Villa is at Bustillos Ranch, west of Chihuahua, attempting to form a junction with Gen. Rosendo Rodriguez, a subordinate, who has retreated to Casas Grandes from Sonora.

Gen. Ysaac Robles may be Governor-General while Gen. Obregon remains in command of the troops.

Gen. Manuel Blandin, who has consented to this agreement and will come to the United States at once, but not through the Juarez port.

Gen. Fiel Avila and his brother, Victoriano Avila, who were being held by Gen. Obregon as prisoners pending the final agreement to the peace terms, were released upon Gen. Obregon's signing the agreement and accepting the terms of peace which Avila signed.

Gen. Jacinto Trevino, with his command of Carranza troops, arrived in Chihuahua city this morning.

Five hundred Villista troops arrived in Juarez last night and this morning. These went over to the Carranzista cause with the exception of a few.

Reports to the Federal authorities are to the effect that arrangements have been made for taking a steamer from Cuba to Buenos Ayres, Argentina, and that negotiations have already been concluded for the Villas to go into the exile raising industry on their property in the South American republic.

Washington has granted permission to Carranza to bring 2,000 rounds of ammunition and 2,000 carbines through Juarez.

A Republican here who went to the dinner and who has returned to Washington with the facts. This man said to-day: "The Gary dinner was not a political conspiracy either to promote Col. Roosevelt's ambitions or to devise ways and means of defeating President Wilson for reelection. So far as the conversation which took place about Mr. Gary's table was concerned there was absolutely no politics in the dinner."

U. S. TRADE \$5,000,000,000; TWO-THIRDS IN EXPORTS

Big Jump in Gold Movement to This Country in Twelve Months Just Ended—Commerce in November \$500,000,000.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—A total trade of \$5,000,000,000 in the month and of \$9,000,000,000 in the year, with exports two-thirds of the whole, is the unparalleled record of American commerce in November and the twelve months ended November 30. Figures made public by the Department of Commerce show that November imports were valued at \$1,614,319,169, as against \$1,267,062,191 in November, 1914, and that they exceeded by \$347,256,978 the former November record made in 1913.
