

SWANN PICKS 38 STAFF MEMBERS; 18 HOLDOVERS

District Attorney Says He Doesn't Even Know Politics of Some Appointees.

FOUR \$7,500 JOBS NOT YET FILLED

District Attorney Swann, who takes office to-day, named thirty-eight members of his professional staff yesterday and said he might announce the names of a few more to-day.

The new head of the office has his own ideas as to the way things should be run. He said all of his statutory assistants would rank evenly and that no one would be called chief assistant.

Card Index at Work.

When Judge Swann consented to see newspaper men, he let it be known that he had already put into effect the card index system of which he has so often spoken in interviews.

Several political lights were picked from the names given out.

John T. Dooling was for many years president of the Board of Elections and was spoken of by Judge Swann as a bright and able trial lawyer.

William Harmon Black has been chairman of the Democratic county committee.

James A. Delehanty, who was slated to stay as a full assistant, was named yesterday by the District Attorney as one of the general sessions to take the place of Judge Swann.

The last thirteen whose names were made public as being on the staff have not had their salaries fixed, but they will range from \$2,500 down to \$2,000 annually.

DELEHANTY IS APPOINTED TO SUCCEED JUDGE SWANN

Gov. Whitman Also Appoints Justice Clarke as Appellate Division's Head.

ALBANY, Dec. 31.—Several judicial appointments were announced by Gov. Whitman this afternoon. Assistant District Attorney James A. Delehanty of New York was named to succeed Judge Edward Swann as Judge of the Court of General Sessions.

Justice John Proctor Clarke of the Appellate Division, First Department, was named to succeed Justice George L. Ingraham, resigned, as presiding Justice.

John C. Clark was named to succeed Justice Ingraham in his capacity as Supreme Court Justice.

Mr. Delehanty, a Democrat, has been Assistant District Attorney of New York county for many years. He frequently has served as acting District Attorney.

Justice John Proctor Clarke, a Republican, has held several city and judicial offices. He was first appointed to the bench in 1900, to fill a vacancy. He was re-elected for a full term and was appointed to the Appellate Division by Gov. Higgins in 1905 and by Gov. Hughes in 1910.

John C. Clark, also a Republican, is a member of the law firm of Olin, Clark & Phelps. Under Mayor Strong he was secretary of the commission to revise the city school laws and was Assistant Corporation Counsel assigned to the office of Mayor Low. He was also first secretary of the Citizens Union.
