
Our heavy artillery bombarded the Turkish batteries on the Asiatic coast. An infantry attack directed against our trenches was easily repulsed.

BRITISH LOSS, 112,921.

Another 90,000 Men Invalided Home From Dardanelles.

The withdrawal of the allied troops from the positions at Suvla Bay and Anzac was announced by the British and French war offices on December 20. The evacuation was carried out under cover of an attack made by British troops aided by French artillery on December 19, according to the official statements.

The accompanying map shows the points on the Gallipoli peninsula which were occupied and held for several months by the Anglo-French expeditionary forces. The Anzac and Suvla Bay positions were evacuated on December 19. The British authorities announced yesterday that the remaining positions, at the tip of the peninsula, have been abandoned. The operation was carried out with the loss of one man wounded.

HALTS MARCH ON EGYPT.

Turkish Commander Demands German Aid Before Suez Attack.

ROME, Jan. 9.—The French-German expedition against Egypt is held in abeyance owing to the refusal of Djemal Pasha, the Turkish commander in Arabi Minor, to attack the Suez Canal without a German vanguard of 25,000 picked troops.

ALLIED ATTACKS SEIZED.

Turks Retaliate for Arrests of Consuls at Salonica.

AMSTERDAM, via London, Jan. 9.—A despatch from Constantinople says that in reprisal for the arrests by the allied staff in Salonica of the Turkish Consul and other Ottoman officials in the Greek port of Salonica, the Turkish Government has arrested ten British and French citizens, including the remaining embassy officials.

ITALY REQUISITIONS WHEAT.

Orders All Grain Not Aside for Military Uses.

RUSSIANS SWEEP ON FRENCH LOSE 1,100 MEN AND 45 GUNS

Austrians Lose Heavily in Vain Attempts to Stem the Onslaught.

GERMAN PRESS ANXIOUS

Special Cable Despatch to The Sun. LONDON, Jan. 9.—The Russians continue to hold the upper hand in the gigantic battle which has been raging for more than a week on the huge battlefront stretching from Kovel to the north-western corner of Bessarabia.

Terrific losses to the Austrians in vain attempts to halt the Russian advance northeast of Czernowitz, the capital of the Bukovina, are reported in the official report issued to-night in Petrograd.

In that region alone, the report says, the Austrians lost 1,173 men and twenty officers.

The Russian official statement follows: Between Riga and the Pripiet the situation is unchanged.

The Russian press appears to have switched the momentum of their offensive from the Czernowitz region to the Volhynian triangle, probably because a decisive battle in Volhynia, such as the capture of the Kovel-Sarny railroad sector, is vital to a continued offensive in the southeast.

By pushing their Czartorysk gains through continued onslaughts the Russians also compel the Austrians to weaken their position in the Volhynian theatre.

Herlin despatches quoting German press comments on the Russian advance on the eastern theatre reveal a note of anxiety with regard to the strength and attacking power of the "Czar's" newly acquired and equipped forces.

Twenty-eight of the strikers, all of whom were making high wages, were arrested. They were fined \$25 each under the munitions act for "unlawfully ceasing work."

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GOEBEN PUT TO FLIGHT.

Russian Torpedo Boats Attack Turkish Cruiser in Black Sea.

PETROGRAD, Jan. 9.—An official report issued here today says the Goeben of the Turkish navy, formerly German, was attacked by Russian torpedo boats in the Black Sea and forced to flee to the Bosphorus.

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WAR CUTS SUPPLY OF SERVANT GIRLS

No Lassies Seeking Work on Adriatic—Getting Men's Jobs in England.

HELD UP AT LIVERPOOL.

The White Star liner Adriatic, in her evening, was held two days at Liverpool by order of the Admiralty, and her passengers were unable to find out the reason for her detention.

There was no one young woman, Irish or English, looking for work as a domestic servant. It was said that there was nothing here to attract the girls, who are getting good wages working in the munition factories and in the fields, taking the places and the higher wages of the girls who have been requisitioned as a transport, she was permitted to proceed on December 31.

There were only twenty-eight passengers in the stowage of the Adriatic. Flight of these were children and nearly all the rest women past middle age.
