

DANIELS PROMISES BIG NAVY IN 16 YEARS

Blames Republicans for Lack of Strength and Lauds Wilson in Speech Here.

SEES PARTY'S SUCCESSES

Secretary of the Navy Daniels, speaking yesterday afternoon at the National Democratic Club, 417 Fifth avenue, forecast some harsh words to say about Republican statesmen and politicians who are attacking the Wilson Administration for its alleged lack of initiative in naval preparedness.

Defends His Naval Policy.

The burden of Mr. Daniels' address was a justification of the naval policy as far pursued by the present Administration and the policy of preparedness for the future as it has been outlined by the President.

Compares Taft Administration.

"During the four years of the Taft Administration two dreadnoughts were provided for. Already during the two and a half years of the Wilson Administration five dreadnoughts have been provided for. In like proportion we are doubling the power of the navy everywhere."

Quoting Rear Admiral Strauss, chief of the ordnance bureau of the navy, Mr. Padgett said that the "powder situation is excellent." "Remember too," warned Mr. Padgett, "that in this country we can make the following quantities of shells in one year: 6,000,000 3 inch, 1,822,000 4 inch, 470,000 5 inch and 305,000 6 inch."
