CAPTIVES UNWOUNDED

The German War Office announced officially today that since the beginning of the attack on Verdun the Germans have taken 430 officers, 26,472 unwounded men, 189 guns and 232 machine guns.

RUSSIAN TAKE KRIRD IN MARCH ON BAGDAD
