DU PONT FIGURES MOST IN FIRST COMMUNIQUE

The Business Men's Presidential League made its appearance in the political horizon yesterday afternoon through the insertion of an advertisement in evening newspapers.

Those who wished to declare themselves in sympathy with this sentiment were asked to sign and mail an attached coupon to the "Business Men's Presidential League, suite 1615, 165 Broadway, New York City."

When reporters came to that address they came into the sunshine of the smile of Ormsby McHarg, the smile that has graced the political fortunes of an extensive variety of the dominant politicians.

Then Mr. McHarg gave out a statement. Even the statement failed to disclose the identity of the men composing the league or the identity of the candidate they had in mind.

"The business men of the country," says the statement, "are concerned with principles rather than personalities, and the league was formed for the promotion of an ideal, not a candidate."

It seeks to bring about the nomination of a candidate for President who can be elected, and to prevent action next June in Chicago that would be party suicide.

The statement then goes on to say that with all the talk the only real crystallization of sentiment is the widespread desire for a change in the administration.

It points out that the United States, instead of being run as the biggest business institution in the world, has been run as a combination of a Chautauque circuit and a laboratory for political experimentation.

It says, "We have been ruled by lawyers, publicists and pedagogues, not by men of business."

"To win next November," declares the league, "the business men of the country must have a candidate who first of all merits and commands the confidence of the business men of the country."
