

NEW PAIR OF PEKES
LOOK LIKE WINNERS

Pao Pey and Li Lien, Imported
by Mrs. Harby Last Week,
Have Great Records.

BOTH HAVE WON OFTEN

By far the most notable importation of Pekingese to reach this country arrived here on the Finland on Monday last. They were two dogs consigned to Mrs. M. E. Harby, owner of the Nowata Kennels, and they came from the kennels of Mrs. Ashton-Cross of London. The dogs are the best that could be procured on the other side and they have been the leading winners at shows over there for the last two years.

One of them, a six pound red dog named Pao Pey of Westcott, is the best small dog that ever has been seen here. He is a bright red with a dense black mask and beautiful feathering. For his weight he has exceptionally heavy bone, is low to ground and has a short chubby body and is a stylish, active little animal. He runs like the minute trotters into view, and his sound active style will make him a big favorite when he is brought out. On the other side he has been a consistent winner, among the best of his kind being at Crufts, 1915, under Mrs. Weaver, where he was placed first over dogs under seven pounds. His next big win was at the People's Palace Show, 1915, under Mrs. Harby, where he was adjudged best red dog in the show and lost the championship certificate only by the loss of a coin.

The judge was unable to decide which dog was the best and she picked Champion Chu Ty of Alderbourne and Pao Pey as the leaders.

When being unable to come to a decision as to which was the better, she tossed a coin to decide the question. Of course this does not seem fair or the proper thing to do, but it shows the quality of the little red dog just brought over by Mrs. Harby, as Champion Chu Ty has long been recognized as the best of his breed on the other side. At the Pekingese Club show under Judge Lefroy Dean Pao Pey was best red dog in the show and also gained this distinction at Crufts under Judge Mrs. Hayes Sadler. He has beaten every dog in England but two and under more than one judge.

Li Lien is a parti-colored dog, the one that just brought over. He is the opposite to Pao Pey in type, being a larger dog, with tremendous bone, a magnificent coat and a magnificent head. Both of these dogs arrived in splendid condition. They have profuse coats, and are none the worse for the trip over. In fact either one would be a credit to the one just brought over. It was Mr. Benjamin's first appearance in the American show ring as a judge, and his awards, taken as they were, pleased the attendance.

T. G. Crosby of New York, who started in the bulldog game a couple of weeks ago, when he purchased Shore Dundee Sir Fred, a dog which had just been imported by the Woodcraft Kennels, was the lucky exhibitor, his entry getting the special for best dog of the show, and the best of the special going to the best bitch of the show. This dog is a lightweight of about forty-five pounds. It is remarkably well balanced all over, and has a good coat. The best of the opposite sex to Sir Fred was W. E. Oakley's Oakwell Sir Westall, a bitch much on the same type as the winner.

It was extremely hard to separate this pair, as although one would excel in a few points the other would show qualities to the advantage. A number of promising puppies made their appearance and in the puppy dog class under 3 months of age the Drewstone King of the Roost, this pup is a white and brindle pig dog and possesses remarkable bone.
