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COL. R. H. I. GODDARD DIES IN PROVIDENCE

Cotton Manufacturer and Civil War Veteran Found Dead in His Home.

PROVIDENCE, April 23.—Col. Robert Hale Ives Goddard, one of the foremost cotton manufacturers in New England, died suddenly during the night at his home in this city.

Col. Goddard was 78 years old, was the son of Prof. William Giles Goddard and Charlotte Reed Ives Goddard and grandson of Robert Ives of the firm of Brown & Ives, the head of which founded Brown University. He was graduated from Brown in 1855. His brother, William Goddard, was once chancellor of the university.

The Goddard brothers and Brown & Ives owned a chain of the largest cotton mills, villages included, in Rhode Island. Col. Goddard was brevetted Major and Lieutenant-Colonel by President Lincoln for distinguished service in the civil war. His daughter, Madeline, is the Marquise d'Andigne and Mrs. C. Oliver Iselin is his niece. His son, Robert H. I. Goddard, Jr., and the latter's son of the same name are the only males to perpetuate the family name. To the son will fall the immense wealth that has accumulated in the Brown, Ives and Goddard families.

Col. Goddard was born in Providence on September 21, 1837, and received the master of arts degree from Brown University in 1858. He served through the civil war, having enlisted with the First Rhode Island Infantry. He was repeatedly promoted for gallantry in action and was for a time aide-de-camp to Gen. Burnside. At the end of the war he was a Lieutenant-Colonel of volunteers.

Col. Goddard was a member of the firm of Goddard, Brown and Brown & Ives cotton manufacturers, as well as an official in other corporations. He was a director of the Rhode Island Hospital Trust Company. His political activities made him a Republican Presidential elector in 1896, when McKinley was elected. He also served as a member of the Rhode Island Society, the State Board of Charities and Correction, as Commissioner of Parks, and in other positions. He was Democratic candidate for United States Senator from Rhode Island in 1907.

Col. Goddard was a member of the board of fellows of Brown University, vice-president of the Rhode Island Historical Society, a member of many clubs, including the Metropolitan and Grolier of New York. He was married in 1855 to Rebekah B. Grosbeck of Cincinnati.

DR. TRAVERS R. MAXFIELD.

For Many Years a Sanitary Superintendent in Brooklyn.

Dr. Travers Rocke Maxfield, for many years sanitary superintendent in charge of the Brooklyn bureau of the Department of Health, died suddenly yesterday at his home, 152 E. 10th street, Brooklyn, of acute indigestion. He was stricken with ptomaine poisoning about a year ago and it is believed he never fully recovered from it. Dr. Maxfield placed Dr. Maxfield at the head of the special hygiene bureau of the Health Department in September, 1905.

Dr. Maxfield was born in Illinois fifty-four years ago. He was graduated from the Michigan College of Medicine in 1884. Directly afterward he came to Brooklyn, where he practiced as a physician for thirty years. He was a member of the Montauk Club, the Crescent Athletic Club and the Apollo Club and was a thirty-second degree Mason. He was Past High Priest of Chaumont Chapter, Royal Arch Masons. He belonged to Kismet Shrine and Damascus Commandery, Knights Templars and was a member of Antiquity Lodge, F. & A. M.

He leaves his wife, who was Miss Alice Barber of New Haven, Conn.

Henry G. Kingins.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., April 23.—Henry Guyon Kingins, member of the Kingins & Tooker Company of New York, died suddenly last night of heart disease at his home in Waverly place.

Kingins was a member of the late Henry Kingins, who founded the Kingins-Tooker Company, and was for many years its president. He was a member of St. John's Episcopal Church and had for more than twenty years been one of its vestrymen. He is survived by one son, three brothers and three sisters.

Charles H. Bang.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., April 23.—Charles H. Bang, president of the Home Talk Publishing Company, publishers of Home Talk, a weekly, died yesterday at his home, 152 E. 10th street, in the Bay Ridge section of Brooklyn, forty-seven years ago.

Mr. Bang was one of the organizers of the greenroom Athletic Club. As manager of the club he put on Terry McGovern for his first fight.

Frederick W. Schettler.

FREDERICK W. Schettler, a real estate dealer, died Saturday at his home, 400 East Fifth street, Flatbush. He was born in the old city of New York sixty-three years ago, and had lived in Brooklyn nearly all his life. He was active in the affairs of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church before and after it merged with St. Luke's.
