FRENCH LINERS ARM TO FIGHT U BOATS

Vessels Will Carry Guns for Use if German Submarines Pursue.

Each of the French liners, by authorization of the French Government, will be equipped hereafter with one of the famous French "seventy-fives," with an effective range of eight miles, for protection against attack by German submarines...

ITALIAN AEROPLANES DROP Bombs on Chapel Containing 400 Children.

VIENNA, via London, April 24.—An air raid by Italian aeroplanes on the Austrian city of Trieste Thursday resulted in the death of nine civilians, including five children. Bombs were dropped on the Silesian monastery. Four hundred children were attending services in the chapel, according to the Austrian statement, dated April 21. A threat of reprisal is contained in the statement, which is as follows:

Seven Italian aeroplanes dropped twenty-two bombs on Trieste yesterday afternoon, killing nine civilians, of whom five were children, and wounding five other persons. The Silesian monastery, in the chapel of which 400 children were attending divine service, was destroyed. By this attack the enemy forfeited every right to the northern part of Gorizia which was shelled by guns of all calibres. There were no other developments, except artillery engagements in some places along the coast and on the Carinthian front.

In the Col di Lana district strong Italian attacks were repulsed. The losses of the enemy were very heavy. The Italians also failed in attacks against positions in the Sugana sector, which were captured by the Austro-Hungarian troops recently, and in assaults against our line west of Sersuola.

SOUTHERN MEXICO MANY GIRLS HERE

ANGRY AT CARRANZA TO JOIN U. S. CAMP

First Chief Said to Be Facing Serious Situation if U. S. Troops Remain.

EL PASO, April 24.—Mexican army officers, that if the American troops are not withdrawn Carranza will face a serious internal situation. They say that in southern Mexico the presence of the American forces in Mexico has created an unfavorable impression upon many of the natives, who think that Carranza is permitting an American invasion.

"Should Carranza withdraw any of his forces from southern Mexico to take the place of the Americans hunting bandits in Chihuahua," said a Carranza officer today, "it is doubtful if the natives in the south would not take advantage of it to start a new revolt against the First Chief."

"While they are ready to believe the stories they hear about Carranza conspiring with the Americans, it would be hard to convince them that he had sent forces to the north merely to enable the Americans to withdraw. Until Carranza can send a large force into northern Mexico I do not believe the Americans will withdraw. If the Americans continue to stay Carranza will face trouble. The number of troops he keeps there. The 'Old Man' is in a serious fix no matter how you look at it."

Supplies Sent to the Front. That there is no intention of withdrawing the American forces immediately was indicated today when eight carloads of supplies were shipped to Carranza at Casas Grandes, the place for the attack on the American troops and executed two of the men as an example to the others. He charged them with being sympathizers with Villa.

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G. O. P. INSISTS UPON VOTE FOR BIG ARMY

Mann Blocks Plan to Let Bill Reach Conference Without Ballot in House.

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Majority leaders of the House, who invoked the aid of the Rules Committee to send the army appropriation bill to conference without allowing opportunity for a vote on some of the provisions of the Senate bill—features which the general staff recommended—were opposed today by the minority leader, Representative Mann.

A lively parliamentary debate was precipitated by the special rule which the bill out of the hands of the Military Affairs Committee as Chairman Hay proposed and sent it to conference. As spokesmen for the minority Representatives Mann and Lenroot made a point of order against the special rule, contending that it encroached upon the privileges of the minority. The Speaker decided in favor of their contention.

The controversy arose out of a demand of Representative Mann that the House be given a chance to register its attitude toward several of the more important features of the Senate bill. The increase of the standing army to 250,000, the creation of a volunteer army and the establishment of a Government nitrate plant. Chairman Hay proposed and sent it to conference. As spokesmen for the minority Representatives Mann and Lenroot made a point of order against the special rule, contending that it encroached upon the privileges of the minority. The Speaker decided in favor of their contention.

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
