

SCOTT TOLD TO ASK OREGON'S AID IN CHASE

Baker Says Instructions Call for Cordial and Complete Cooperation.

WAR MINISTER TO BE IN JUAREZ TO-DAY

Pending Conference Negotiations for Withdrawal Will Stop.

WASHINGTON, April 26.—Full instructions to Gen. Hugh L. Scott, Chief of Staff, to govern him in his coming conferences with Gen. Obregon, Minister of War of Mexico, were telegraphed by Secretary of War Baker to-night.

MRS. ROGERS SET FREE ON GROUND OF INSANITY

Prosecutor Dismisses Second Indictment and Will Not Press Case Against Husband—Jury Is Out Two Hours.

"Not guilty on the ground of insanity." Such was the verdict returned by the jury at 3:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon, after fifty-three hours after Mrs. Ida Shuffen Rogers had been arraigned in the Bronx Supreme Court on charges of poisoning her baby son sixteen months ago. The jury was out less than two hours.

According to the prosecuting authorities, there is no possibility that Mrs. Rogers will be sent to an asylum for the criminal insane, although the jury's verdict was, "Not guilty because of insanity." This means, members of the District Attorney's staff said, that Mrs. Rogers was held to be insane only at the time of the commission of the act. The jury considered her to be of sound mind and sane at the time of the trial.

ALL REJOICE AT OUTCOME.

Probably not a soul connected with the case but was heartily rejoiced at its outcome. District Attorney Martin, who presided at the trial, congratulated the jury on their verdict and made his closing address to the jury at a masterpiece of invective, confessed after all was over that he hadn't wanted for a minute to wait for the jury's verdict.

WILL RECAPITULATE IN COURT.

Lewis Stuyvesant Chanler, Mrs. Rogers' lawyer, took her and her husband away in his automobile. They went to the Rogers apartment on Upper Broadway, but Mr. Chanler said the two would soon go to the country with their eight-month-old baby daughter, to enable Mrs. Rogers to recover from the strain.

HOGERS SEVERELY TWISTED.

Lorley Elton Rogers twisted in his chair, his face flushed and his hands clenched as the District Attorney decried his case. Mrs. Rogers did not seem to hear.

NEAR A FIST FIGHT OVER FERRINO BILL

CANADIAN INQUIRY ON.

OTTAWA, April 26.—The royal commission appointed to investigate charges against the Canadian military in connection with the Philippine case, the United States began its work today. The only evidence of importance adduced was a letter from Sir Courtney Bennett, former British Consul-General in Manila, to the Philippine commission, warning it that certain firms in the United States seeking Canadian orders were under German influence and had no intention of fulfilling contracts.

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U. S. NOW ON RECORD.

The United States heretofore has not made public its position on the latest points raised by Germany and the memorandum makes the stand of the American Government clear.

THE RIGHT TO SINK.

Attacking ships are conceded the right to use force if a merchantman of belligerent nationality, aware of the approach of an enemy warship, uses its armament to keep the enemy at a distance, or if the merchantman resists or flees after being summoned to surrender.

CONFIDENCE IN BERNSTORFF.
