The Yankees enjoyed a romp at the Polo Grounds yesterday. They were so much superior to the champion Red Sox that the game was there after they had had their turn at bat in the first inning. The score was 9 to 0, and Markle, the silent, who turned the Athletics back with one run last week, held the Red Sox to four hits. He was as free with his bases on balls as usual, giving six, but the consummate and disdainful ease with which he kept the succeeding batters from doing anything made it appear that perhaps the tactician Markle was kidding the king pins of Christendom.

The Yankees slatted McAlle lastly in the first inning and from a round of hitting acquired five tallies. Harold Javrin slipped in one of three errors, two of which added materially to the run increment of the revelling Yankees. If some Red Sox wasn't making a fool of himself, the Yankees would have been making a bit off either McAlle or Gregg to enable the blue stockings to run away from the red stockings. The Yankees had not only to beat the Red Sox, but to beat the rain. It did not rain as the sudden afternoon turned out. In the field, some believe is slight, before the game was officially such the Red Sox were in any reckless hurry to expiate mistakes. The Yankees, on the contrary, were as steady as a rock from the first inning as working capital, they went out willingly in order to get in the four and a half innings needed to constitute a game.

Maize Is Slow for Once.

Fritz Maize, for once in his life, was slow on the bases. He invited a double play by his slothfulness in getting back to base, but the Red Sox were more eager to put him out than he was to get back and the double play didn't come off.

Baker and Nunamaker led the New York hitting. Each made three hits. Nunamaker's grand included a triple and a double. He has had a two-day hitting streak, which is the longest time as the American League's boss slugger. Seven hits in eight times at bat, and two doubles and two triples in the collection of slugging.

Pool Line Is Damaged.

Baker piled up a single hopping at Hobbs' feet in the seventh and was forced by Gedeon, who hit hard to Javrin. Gedeon was doubled and the bases were cleared of encumbrances, but only momentarily. Mone, Peep he tak' walk, and then Herr Javrin gave a few kicks to a ground ball batted by Peckinpugh. Nunamaker, the dreadnought of the willow, hit so hard past third for two bases as to bend the fourth base into shape, and of course to land Pipp and Peckinpugh at the plate.
