

PITTSBURG PLANTS CLOSE; 120,000 OUT

Westinghouse Interests Give Up Attempt to Operate When Strike Spreads.

COAL FAMINE IS FEARED

PITTSBURG, April 26.—With today's additions the list of persons now unemployed in the Pittsburgh district approximates 120,000.

Every Westinghouse plant located in the Turtle Creek Valley was closed down for an indefinite period this afternoon.

Strikes inaugurated at Wilmerding and Swissvale today had a direct bearing on the issuing of the order to close down.

Of the 5,500 persons employed in the airbrake plant nearly 4,000 refused to enter the works this morning.

At the Union Switch and Signal works more than half of the 2,000 employees also refused to report.

Practically all of the employees in the other three Westinghouse plants in East Pittsburgh have been out for several days.
