

PITTSBURG FACES STRIKE OF 100,000

Labor Troubles Have Already Caused Walkout of 50,000.

CAR LINE TIEUP TO-DAY

PITTSBURG, Pa., April 30.—With 50,000 men already on strike and as many more threatening to quit unless their demands are met, the Pittsburgh district faces an industrial condition without precedent.

The warfare between employer and employee that will under a May day of 1916 grow for the most part out of disputes over what is reasonable.

Want 15, 8, Steel Men to Quit. Twenty thousand men, it is estimated, have quit their jobs during the last week in other mills and factories in Pittsburgh and suburban towns.

Among strikes promised inside the city limits to-morrow that of 1,500 men employed by the Black Diamond works of the Crucible Steel Company.

From indications 5,000 men will be idle in Youngstown, Ohio, to-morrow on account of labor troubles.

More than 1,500 machinists will be affected. They demand a 50-cent per day, a minimum wage of 50 cents an hour.

The strike, if it takes place, will stop operations at the plants of the William Tod Company, the United Engineering and Foundry Company and the Automatic Sprinkler Company.

Labor conditions in West Virginia are in sharp contrast with those in Ohio and western Pennsylvania.

Probably not a car will move to-morrow on the lines of the Pittsburgh Railways Company, including suburban lines to Beaver.

Mayor Joseph C. Armstrong and Assistant City Solicitor C. Robinson tried throughout to-day to arbitrate the differences between the railway company and its men.

The railway employees want an advance in wages of practically 16 2/3 per cent. This would amount to \$500,000 annually.

Sub-committee to Make Known Wage Agreement Decision.

The sub-committee of the anthracite miners announced yesterday that it would report to-day to the trial district board, or scale committee, of the workers.

The board is expected to endorse the tentative wage agreement entered into between the members of the sub-committee and the operators.

200,000 THREATEN TO STRIKE HERE TO-DAY

Labor Situation in City Serious, but Truces May Prevent Great Walkout of Workers—Wage Increases Are Cause of Unrest.

New York City has been seldom, if ever, confronted with a more serious labor situation than that of to-day.

But it is not only in New York City that the situation is ominous. To-day, May 1, strikes in many lines of industrial activity are to be called if demands presented by the workers are not met.

Their national organization embraces some 10,000 men. In New York City alone there are about 15,000 of them.

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Unrest Traced to Prosperity. The reason for this unprecedented condition is the wave of prosperity that has swept over the country since the war in Europe began, especially during the last year.

It is impossible to forecast what would be the effect of a general strike by the workers in every one of these unions.

Unions Deny United Action. The leaders of the workmen in the industries that may be tied up to-day assert that no central body has directed the movement.

Higher Wages for 30,000. Cleveland Workers in a Dozen Different Trades Benefited.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, April 30.—May day in Cleveland will bring substantial wage increases to more than 30,000 workmen in a dozen different trades.
