Believes Crisis Past. BERLIN GETS REPLY. Delivered to Foreign Office by Ambassador Gerard.

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BERLIN ADMITS U BOAT TORPEDOED THE SUSSEX; COMMANDER PUNISHED Adequate Indemnity to Go to Americans Injured in Mishap, Says Note—Submarine Mistook Steamer for a Transport, Is German Contention.

WASHINGTON, May 10.—The German Government has admitted in a note to the United States made public today by Secretary Lansing that one of her U boats sunk the Channel steamer Sussex. She is ready to pay indemnity and has punished the commander of the submarine. The text of the note follows:

Supplementing his note of the 4th inst. concerning the conduct of the German submarine warfare, the undersigned has the honor to inform his Excellency the American Ambassador, James W. Gerard, that the further investigation made by the German naval authorities concerned in regard to the French steamer Sussex, on the basis of the American material, has been concluded in the meantime.

Thought It Warship. In view of the general impression of all the facts at hand, the German Government considers it beyond doubt that the commander of the submarine acted in the bona fide belief that he was facing an enemy warship. On the other hand, it cannot be denied that, misled by the appearance of the vessel, under the pressure of the circumstances, he formed his judgment too hurriedly in establishing her character and did not therefore act fully in accordance with the strict instruction which called upon him to exercise particular care.
