Usual efforts are being made to render the annual garden party of the Army Relief Society at Governors Island on Friday afternoon a great success in every way. The island is one of the most attractive spots in this vicinity, with its fine trees, lawns and garden grounds, and the touch of garden life to be seen there is always interesting.

The garden party is being held under the auspices of Branch No. 1, of which Mrs. Charles F. Roe is president. The object of the society is to aid widows and emergency sufferers, and enlisted men of the regular army of the United States, and it has helped more than 200 children and at least 500 widows. Already the list of needy ones has been increased by women and children left alone by the casualties in Mexico. The emergency payments grow larger each year and the list of monthly payments does not grow less.

The people in New York have been very generous to those in distress on account of the war in Europe, and while not ceasing their good work on the other side of the water it is hoped that these generous persons, who have paid as much as \$25 for a single ticket for foreign aid, will remember their own.

The programme to be offered on Friday afternoon will be interesting and it will include company dinners, aeroplane flights and evening parades. In addition to music of military bands from New York harbor Miss Anna Fitzla of the Metropolitan Opera will sing "The Star Spangled Banner."

There will be as customary many tents on the lawn where light refreshments will be served and flowers, confectionery and knickknacks sold, and there will be during the afternoon a dance in the Officers Club. The Yale Orchestra, an outcome of the Yale Glee Club, will play for dancing in conjunction with the regular band of Governors Island, so there need be no break in the dancing with the continuous music. After 6 supper will be served by Mazetti in tents on the lawn at 75 cents for each person.

The price of tickets to the garden party has been placed at the moderate sum of \$1 each, and there will be an extra charge of 50 cents for the dancing at the club. With such moderate prices thousands of patriotic Americans should take advantage of the opportunity to help widows and orphans of their officers and soldiers, who if they are not suffering from the immediate effects of war are yet in need of those things that go to keep body and soul together.


