Y., overlooking Van Cortlandt Park and the Hudson. A similar pageant was conducted last year on the estate of George W. Perkins, and it was so attractive that it is being reproduced frequently in motion pictures. This festival will mark the conclusion of the Red Cross membership campaign and the proceeds will be used in maintaining the five nurses of the Van Cortlandt Chapter who are in France doing duty in field hospitals. It is expected that it will be the occasion of a grand membership rally, in which the community spirit of Riverdale will have full and free expression. The pageant is being conducted under the immediate direction of Mrs. George B. Pezram, assisted by Miss Dorothy Freeman and Miss Anne Webb, designers of costumes, and Mrs. William H. McCloskey, marshal of the children who are to exemplify the seasons as ambassadors, flowers, snowflakes and clouds, or as foresters, wrestlers and villagers. The boys cast for the parts of Robin Hood, Friar Tuck and Will Scarlet and the Irish dancers are experienced and require but little rehearsing. Mrs. Pezram herself will appear in classical dances.

The Riverdale Choral Society, with Howard D. Barlow as conductor, will render selections in harmony with the occasion. Mrs. George W. Perkins is first soprano of the chorus and Mrs. Judith Looney, Lyeth of Fieldston will sing folk songs. Others in the double quartet include Miss Dorothy Morgan, soprano, Mrs. William D. Barbour, Miss Dorothy Perkins, the Misses Uple Grove, Aylette Buckner, Mrs. Mary Buckner and George B. Pezram.

The Woodlands Theatre will be open to motor parties from the city and to the general public. Tickets may be obtained at the entrance to the grounds on the day of the festival, or by application by letter to the officers of Van Cortlandt Chapter of the American Red Cross. In case of rain the pageant will be postponed to the Saturday following (June 10) at the same hour. Prices of admission range from 25 cents to \$19 for a box seating six persons.

For the convenience of persons from the city automobiles will be stationed at the Van Cortlandt Park station of the subway. Those coming in their own motor cars are advised to approach the Woodlands Theatre via Broadway to 42d street, thence west through Spuyten Duyvil Parkway to the Deafield estate, where policemen or Boy Scouts will direct visitors to the scene of the pageant. Automobiles will meet all trains from the Grand Central Terminal at Riverdale-Hudson. In fact guides and automobiles will be available at all points of entrance into Riverdale.
