

NEW GUARDIA ON WHITE BATTLE PREDICTED

Thirty Guards on Lake Island Ready to Resist After Ten Ousted Men Are Held.

DOYLE SEEKS ALBANY AID

Developments came rapidly yesterday in the fight between the vigilance committee of 100 and other Staten Island organizations which are seeking to prevent the erection of a municipal garage plant on Lake Island and the contractors who have drawn plans for the building.

As the company intends to maintain its guard indefinitely many on Staten Island predict another clash before many hours have passed. Doyle hinted last night that his builders need resistance he will make no plea to the Mayor or the Police Commissioner but will go to Albany and lay his case before the Governor.

Doyle has possession of the island for only a short time Saturday night, though the small force of guards Doyle's men surprised beat a hasty retreat. The police boat, which was on the island in pursuit of the Doyle party, managed to right herself after half an hour's delay and the ten were arrested and taken to the police station in Stapleton where they were locked up for the night.

ACCUSED CATHOLIC PRIESTS CHALLENGE MAYOR TO ACT

Want Quick Step to Prosecute, Says Their Lawyer—Seymours Want Apologies From Mitchell and Others—Some Pastors for Wire Tapping.

See Change in Mayor's Mind.

"Now it seems he has suffered a change of heart. Not only does he charge the fourth priest, namely, Robert W. Heber, former secretary of the State Board of Charities, with crime, but the three others, he says that William J. Fitzgibbon, special agent in charge, should be held in contempt of court, and that Heber, on the stand at the Strong investigation, had denied intimacy with Dr. D. B. McLaughlin, a member of the board, and that Heber had not been on friendly terms for quite some time.

Ministers Discuss Dispute.

Several ministers in their sermons yesterday commented on the wire tapping controversy. The Rev. S. Edward Young, pastor of the Bedford Presbyterian church, told his congregation that he thought Mayor Mitchell was right in principle. Dr. Young said:

"This is a moment when those of us who put aside party and creed to represent the great majority of their congregations, attempted to secure for the people of this city a right in principle. Dr. George Drew Egbert of the Congregational Church of Flushing lauded the Mayor's action in the wire tapping case. He said that wire tapping was detestable except for the detection of crime, but that the man who has plotted to assassinate the Mayor is under no obligation of others to treat him as honest.

Fears Mistaken Loyalty.

"The issue of many instances that have given others the belief that Catholics are loyal to their church to the extent of being disloyal to their country," he said. "Many Protestants have concluded that the question of loyalty between Rome and this country and whether a mistaken sense of loyalty to their faith might not lead Catholics to do things that are not in their own country."

Waite, Cheerful, Asks to Go to Jail Church
