


Ten Forty-Foot Sloops of New Class Furnish Interesting Contest in Their First Race, on Long Island Sound

ZILPH PROVES VICTOR IN FIRST RACE OF NEW YORK YACHT CLUB 40-FOOTERS

Jerome Monks Handles Craft Owned by J. E. Hayes, Jr., in Masterly Fashion.

TEX OF NEW CLASS STARTS: BARBARA BEATS FIFTIES

The Barbara, owned and sailed by Harry Payne Whitney, won the race of the New York Yacht Club for 40 footers yesterday, and the Zilph, owned by J. E. Hayes, Jr., took the event for the new 40 footers. It was the first contest for the 40 footers, twelve of which have been built by Herreshoff, and of the dozen there were only two absentees, the Black Duck and the Pampero. The Black Duck was at the line, but broke her tiller just before the start. On board the Zilph with Mr. Hayes were Jerome and Robert Monks, Jerome Monks had the tiller.

The new sloops looked very attractive and gave promise of furnishing some close racing this summer, but yesterday they were new, their sails did not fit well and their owners seemed rather timid in their handling. With a few more races they will have learned their yachts and will then be able to drive them for all they are worth. The wind was light yesterday and they sailed over a course 18 1/2 miles long, half of which was running and the other half on the wind. On actual sailing the 50 footer Barbara beat the 40 footer Zilph 24 minutes. The Zilph beat the 30 footer Lena, the winner in the 30 footer class, 34 minutes 42 seconds. The 30 footer stuck close to the new 40s, and some of the 30s outsailed the 40s over the course. The race was held in the rather slow in the light weather. It was the impression among those who watched the races that they will be at their best in fresh strong winds.

The regatta committee was on board Commodore George F. Baker's steamer Viking and a large fleet of steamers followed the yachts over the course. Among these were Morton P. Plant's Vanadis, former Commodore Frederick G. Bourne's Alberta, Alexander Smith's Cochran's Warrior, Vice-Commodore J. Morgan's Commodore Leonard, Richard J. Carey's Henry, Walter S. Narada, Charles Sweeney's Esmeine, J. C. and N. E. Brady's Atlantic, E. C. Benedict's media. There was also a large fleet of lower yachts, among them some of the new express cruisers which have been built for service in case of hostilities. There were also a number of yachts in the race, and at all had been built by Herreshoff it might have been called a Herreshoff regatta. Commodore George F. Baker, Jr., sailed the Ventura, Vice-Commodore J. Morgan called the Graveling and was assisted by his son, Junior, George Nichols, who for two years has sailed on the Resolute, handled the newly purchased Carolina, and Mr. Whitney sailed the Barbara. These were sent away at 1:10 o'clock by the committee. J. Morgan, J. M. Macdonough and F. O. Spedden. The course was from a line at mark D, which is off Prospect and Mott's Points, to the buoy at Wood's Point, to the southwest and the first leg was 2 1/2 miles to leeward. Begins Season Well in the Annual Regatta of the Harlem Yacht Club.

FIFTY YACHTS AT START

With a fleet of fifty yachts at the starting line and a fine breeze from the southwest to drive them around the course to a fairly early finish the Harlem Yacht Club exercised its time-honored privilege of opening the yachting season on Long Island Sound with its annual regatta yesterday. The starting point was at the northeast buoy on Execution Reef and the triangular course was laid out four miles at the entrance to Hempstead harbor and the second angle off the Westchester shore, so that the yachts had a reaching start, a broad reach, across the Sound, a good windward leg in coming home.

The Carolina took second place, beating the Graveling home by one second. The 40 footers were nearly all aligned at the start with the little Dipper first, a trifle ahead of the Zilph, which followed in order by Jessica, Sunway, Maise, Katherine, Mistral, Rowdy, Pauline and Shavano. All carried spinners and went down the wind quite fast. The Rowdy gradually worked into the lead and was first to turn the mark. The Katherine was followed next by Jessica, Mistral and Zilph. A few seconds later the Zilph showed some fast sailing. She was handled with good judgment and kept the lead for the rest of the race. The Zilph finished first, 1 minute 21 seconds ahead of the Ventura. Commodore Baker, however, announced that before the start he had fouled the Barbara and therefore was disqualified.
