



CANADA A MAGNET WITH LOW EXCHANGE

American Money is Going There for Investment.

Special Despatch to THE SUN AND NEW YORK HERALD.
MONTREAL, Feb. 7.—New York funds were at \$1.17 to-day, with sterling around \$1.50. Notwithstanding the plethora of securities being offered in New York, considerable American money is coming for investment in Canadian securities. The advantage of from 15 to 20 per cent. is a strong magnet. Advice is to buy at home and do without luxuries from the United States. Canadian buyers of dry goods have a decided advantage in the British market on the exchange, but the supply of finished goods is not equal to the demand. Therefore it becomes necessary for much buying to be done in the United States. Some American concerns are meeting their Canadian customers half way on the exchange.




