Cites Washington as Exemplar of Reverence for Constituted Authority.

SERVICES IN ST PAUL'S

Vice-President Marshall Chief Speaker at Luncheon of Sulgrave Institution.

Services in commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the landing of the Pilgrims and the birthday of George Washington under the auspices of the Sulgrave Institution were held at noon yesterday in St. Paul's Chapel, Broadway and Vesey street, where the first President was once a worshiper.

CATHOLICS TO HEAR PASTORAL LETTER

Cardinal Gibbons Reviews War and Unrest in Message.

Priests of the Roman Catholic Church of the city, State and nation will read their congregations this morning the first pastoral letter issued by the Catholic hierarchy in more than thirty years. James Cardinal Gibbons, Archbishop of Baltimore, who is the sole survivor of the seventy-six bishops who signed the joint pastoral letter issued during the Third Plenary Council at Baltimore in 1848, signs the latest communication to the laity.

Reverence for Authority.

"No lesson is more important and compelling than that of the reverence of the great Washington for constituted authority," said the bishop. "But we are American Christians not lacking in a strong sense of reverence for God and the things of God, which our forefathers had. We see this in the present day independence of children, the determination of the young to go their own sweet way, the growing dislike of any authority, and the loudly avowed view that any man or organization is as good as any other, which gives rise to many acts of impudence and sheer boorishness.

AUDIENCE IN MOVIES WATCHES REAL FIRE

DAY NEWLY ACCUSED IN NOTE BY O'MALLEY

Mayor Believes District Attorney Should Consider.

Dr. Jonathan C. Day, ousted Commissioner of Public Markets, was unmistakably the subject of a letter which his successor, E. J. O'Malley, wrote yesterday to Mayor Hylan and to which Mayor Hylan replied by urging that "the matter" be called to the attention of the District Attorney. Dr. Day, as Mr. O'Malley charges, is selling at his navy stores goods that are not army and navy goods, and though the prices are so low that competition is difficult the public really is being imposed upon.

Y. M. C. A. WAR CHEST WAS \$161,722,649

Final Accounting by William Sloane Shows Balance of \$17,000,000.

Of the \$161,722,649 raised by the Y. M. C. A. since April, 1917, a full accounting made yesterday by William Sloane, chairman of the National War Work Council of the Y. M. C. A. shows that \$17,000,000 is left over, including proceeds from the disposal of Y. M. C. A. huts, trucks and general equipment.

WORK IS STILL GOING ON

Welfare Service and Vocational Training to Receive Most of the Surplus.

A constructive programme is already in progress which will use this reserve fund, the final accounting set forth. Welfare services for American soldiers and sailors still will be carried on by the Y. M. C. A. Other sums will be used for vocational training, for an educational programme and for a reserve fund, which will be set aside for any future emergency.

MINERS TO STRIKE IN WALES.

30,000 Expected to Go Out in Rhondda Valley to-morrow.

LONDON, Feb. 21.—A strike in one of the groups of Welsh coal miners has been set for Monday, says a Central News despatch to-day from Perth, Wales. Delegates representing the Rhondda Valley mines, the message says, have decided to order the strike to enforce demands for the dismissal of a certain check weighman and for the settlement of a case of alleged victimization of a miner. Thirty thousand men are affected.

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
