

CITY HALL PUSHING NEW SCHOOL BILLS

Craig Appeals to Albany to Tear Great Power From Ettinger's Hands.

BILLS LAID TO SYSTEM

Money Wasted, It Is Said, and Almost 1,000,000 Children Lack Proper Teaching.

The old contest between City Hall and the Board of Education for control of educational matters and the conflict between Superintendent Ettinger and city officials in particular are believed to have prompted the introduction of the measures.

With almost 1,000,000 children of school age without adequate school facilities, the people of the city are without any effective control over their schools and are "compelled to submit to increasing congestion and progressive deterioration of school property under the administration of an irresponsible bureaucracy."

Not until the Board of Education is made up of members who receive adequate salaries and devote all their time to their work can the school system be administered properly, the Comptroller states.

TREATY BURDEN TOO BIG, SAYS CRAVATH

Germany Cannot Meet Economic Demands.

Paul D. Cravath, speaking yesterday at a luncheon of the League of Free Nations Association in the Hotel Commodore, said the economic clauses of the peace treaty put a burden upon Germany which he did not believe she could carry.

Mr. Cravath predicted that years hence the wonder would grow that such a treaty should have been drafted. He favored its revision by direct negotiations with the defeated nations immediately.

Stone, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers; Roger W. Babson, the statistician, Senator Charles McNary and Senator Spencer of Missouri have been invited to join the team.

POLICE HAVE CLUE IN DOUBLE MURDER

Second Victim Is Identified by Tailor's Name in Suit.

Identification of the body of the young Italian found lying beside that of Dr. Vincent J. Campbell in a furnished room house at 496 Lorimer street, Brooklyn, last Thursday night, as that of Lorenzo Sarullo, 29 years old, of 237 Fourth street, Elizabeth, N. J., and establishing the fact that both men died of stab wounds, were the chief developments yesterday in the police investigation into the double murder.

Detectives went to Elizabeth with a photograph of the dead man to see H. Harris, a tailor, whose name was found sewed in the victim's clothing. Mr. Harris identified the photograph as that of the man for whom he had made the suit and led the detectives to "Lorenzo" Sarullo of 621 Third avenue, brother of the dead man. Mr. Sarullo was positive it was his brother's photograph, but was urged by the detectives to visit Kings county morgue so the identification might be complete.

SUGAR CANNOT MEET DEMANDS FOR CANDY

Famine Seen Unless Consumption Is Lessened.

There is grave danger of a sugar famine in the United States unless the consumption of sweets is materially reduced, according to a report sounded yesterday by Dr. S. Dana Hubbard, director of the Bureau of Public Health Education of the Department of Health. Dr. Hubbard declared 5,200,000 tons of sugar was consumed in 1925, an increase of 90,000 over previous years, the per capita increasing three to five years from seventy-three to ninety-two pounds.

16 HIGH SCHOOL TEACHERS GO.

Principal of Commerce Institution Issues Threat Too.

The Citizens Committee to Save the Schools announced yesterday that sixteen teachers in the High School of Commerce have resigned to enter more remunerative businesses and professions since last September, and that Arthur M. Wolfson, principal, is contemplating resigning unless increased pay is provided for the school teachers before next fall.

Fearing Blindness, Ends Life.

Fear of growing blindness led Fred W. Pitcher, a retired automobile salesman, to take his life by inhaling gas. He was found yesterday in his room at the house of M. H. Hasbrouck, 216 West 102d street. Mrs. Hasbrouck, detecting escaping gas coming from the man's room, called a policeman, who pried open the door. Pitcher was 60 years old.

PARROT AND MONKEY GONE; JAGUAR WINKS

Explorer Loses Part of Animal Collection on Ship.

Among the passengers which did not go ashore yesterday when the Booth liner Manoa, from South America, docked at Pier 7, Brooklyn, were a parrot and a monkey.

The two missing animals were part of an aggregation of snakes, monkeys, jaguars, birds and other South American animals that were immigrating to North America with William J. La Varre, an explorer. Mr. La Varre took his collection aboard at Para, at the mouth of the Amazon.

On the trip northward the parrot indiscreetly became friendly with a jaguar. It looked as if the millennium had arrived to the passengers, but one day when the parrot was walking around on the jaguar's head the animal sneezed, or yawned, or something and the parrot disappeared. A monkey, which had been the parrot's most intimate friend, excepting only the jaguar, was much affected by the incident. Next day he, too, had vanished, but whether he drowned himself in despair or went to join the parrot was a matter of debate the rest of the trip northward. The jaguar took no part in the discussion, beyond occasionally licking his chops.

Labor Body Is Suspended.

The Central Federated Union was notified yesterday by Frank Morrison, secretary of the American Federation of Labor, that because the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees insisted upon encroaching upon the personnel and jurisdiction boundaries of other organized bodies of workers, the United Brotherhood has been suspended and that its delegates may not sit in the conference of the C. F. U. until the A. F. of L. lifts the ban. The suspended union claims membership of 150,000.
