

CROKER AND WIFE READY FOR TRIAL

Illness of Judge Donnell Delays Hearing of Suit Brought by His Children.

COUSIN DEFENDS WOMAN

Old Tammany Boss Tells Why He Transferred Property—Case May Begin Monday.

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., April 7.—Counsel for Mr. and Mrs. Richard Croker completed their case to-day and are ready to go to trial on the charge that the old "Boss of Tammany Hall" is senile and that his wife, owing to this alleged fact, has managed to get much of his property away from him.

Wife Made Money for Him. "I am an old man," said Mr. Croker, "and I felt that my wife ought to own the home in which we live."

Mr. Croker said to-day that he afterward transferred the Wisconsin and some adjacent property, also held by his brother-in-law, to his wife because he wanted her to have the home in her name.

Mrs. Croker's Life in Detail. Harold Nathan, Mrs. Croker's cousin, issued a formal statement to-day in which he defended her against the accusations of the Croker children and

save all the details of her early life. He said: "She was born in Indian Territory, near Mayville, Ark. in 1864. She never has misrepresented her age. She is enrolled as a Cherokee Indian, one of the five civilized tribes, and has an allotment of land as a member of such tribe. Her parents are substantial people, owning a ranch of five hundred acres. Her uncle is now a member of Congress. She was educated in the Cherokee National Female Seminary at Tahlequah, Indian Territory, and was graduated in 1882. She then took a course in the summer normal school of Chicago University and afterward taught mathematics at the Tahlequah Seminary for about five years.

"About 1895 she went to Boston and entered Dr. Curry's School of Expression. She was there for three years, taking a four year course in that time. Her parents paid her expenses. She returned to Indian Territory about 1911 and taught expression to private pupils in Muskogee, also gymnastics in the public schools. In March, 1913, she went to the Wilson Inaugural, representing Oklahoma in the suffrage parade, and then went to New York, where she studied voice work under teachers of music. She maintained herself by giving recitals and by means of remittances from her parents.

WOMAN FREED AS HOMICIDE. Acquitted of Murder of Her Divorced Husband. HAMPTON, Va., April 7.—Mrs. Mittie Fisher Cummings, charged with the murder of her divorced husband, who was shot to death in the street here, was acquitted to-night by a jury.

Jury had deliberated only four minutes. Mrs. Cummings's ex-husband, S. Gordon Cummings, a lawyer and former member of the Legislature, was killed February 7. Mrs. Cummings told the jury she met him that day and asked for money, and that she threatened to look her up again.
