The National Federation of Music Clubs, Mrs. Julian Edwards president, will present in concert in Aeolian Hall on Thursday afternoon Miss Ruth Hutchinson, soprano; Arthur Klein, piano, and Terry Ferrell; violinist, who are national prize winners of the organization's Young Artists' Course. The prize is a New York debut given at the expense of the Aeolian Company biennially to the winners of these national contests. The programme includes soprano's air, "Come, My Beloved," on a theme by Handel and the first movement from Vieuxtemps's D minor violin concerto.

The New Symphony Orchestra, Arthur Bodansky conductor, on May 5 will play in Carnegie Hall at a Polish festival concert under the auspices of the American Committee for Aid in the Republic of Poland. Gov. Alfred E. Smith is honorary chairman of the committee, with William Le Gendre chairman and Brigadier General J. D. Andrews vice chairman. The patronesses are headed by Mrs. John Henry Hammond and Mrs. James A. Burden, Jr. Among the Polish artists to appear are Mmes. Lydia Lipkova, soprano, and Tamara Lubimova, pianist. The decorations will be in charge of W. T. Benda, Polish artist, who is making a poster for the concert.

The New York Symphony Orchestra in its two months' tour overseas will visit five countries and give more than fifty concerts, closing on June 30 at Albert Hall, London, under King George's patronage. The opening date has been changed to May 6, 8 and 9 at the Paris Opera, and thereafter Bordeaux, Lyons, Marseilles (two) and Monte Carlo, in Italy, starting May 9 at Genoa, there will also be concerts at Rome (two), Florence, Bologna, Turin and Milan (two). Then northward the tour includes Strasbourg, Metz, Nancy and again Paris, on June 4, at the Trocadero. A Belgian visit takes in Brussels, Antwerp, Liege and Ghent, followed by The Hague and Amsterdam, Holland, and five concerts in the British metropolis, where all but the last will be held at Queen's Hall. The assisting artists are Albert Spalding, violinist, and John Powell, pianist and composer. The tour is financed by the president of the Symphony society, Harry Harkness Flagler.

The twenty-fourth biennial Music Festival in Cincinnati will be held on May 4-8, under the direction of Eugen Ysaye. There will be four choral evening concerts and two matinees devoted to vocal solo and instrumental music. The solo singers will be Mmes. Matzenauer, Florence Hinks, Merle Alcock, Edward Johnson, Lambert Murphy, Dan Bedoe, Reinold Warrenrath and Jose Mardones.
