ALIENISTS TO STUDY DEAD CROOK'S BRAIN

Chicago Medical Men to Examine Body of James J. Harrigan.

COLLEGES INTERESTED

Woman to Whom He Proposed Marriage Sheds Tear for Him.

Special to THE SUN AND NEW YORK HERALD. CHICAGO, April 28.—One of the most unusual conventions in the history of Chicago will be held here in about thirty days. At that time the body of James J. Harrigan, "gentleman crook" of practically every known branch of crime, will be turned over to the Chicago Demonstrators Association. This association is composed of a group of medical colleges and the body will be used for anatomical purposes.
